DIOCESAN UPDATE TO LITURGICAL PROTOCOLS

Bishop Bambera recently released updated liturgical protocols in response to the improved numbers of Covid-19 transmission rate within the 11 counties of the Diocese of Scranton. Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are no longer required to wear masks during Mass. The distribution of Precious Blood from the cup continues to remain suspended at this time. The faithful are asked to reverence the Cross with either a bow or a genuflection, instead of kissing or embracing the Cross on Good Friday. As always, if the number of positive cases surges in a specific county – or within a specific parish community in the future – mitigation measures may be reconsidered and reinstated.

Because many of our faithful have found great comfort in their priest or EMHC wearing a mask during the distribution of Holy Communion, Fr. Mosley will continue to wear his mask when he distributes the Eucharist. Anyone who is more comfortable with their minister wearing a mask, can simply come to his line to receive Communion.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

Christians around the world are united in a special way during Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. Our hearts, minds, and prayers are also especially aware of the Holy Land. Our parish, once a year on Good Friday, is called on to support Christians in the Holy Land. Many Christians in the Holy Land depend on the collection for their lives. As a pontifical collection requested by Pope Francis, the annual Good Friday Collection offers a direct link for parishioners to be witnesses of peace and to help protect the Holy Places and the work of the Franciscans and others in the Holy Land. Liturgical Reflection ~ Palm Sunday

GOSPEL AT THE PROCESSION: Luke 19:28-40

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord is the first day of Holy Week and the day that commemorates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem before his arrest and crucifixion. For Luke, the journey began ten chapters earlier with a statement in which we are told that Jesus "resolutely determined to journey to Jerusalem." The triumphant entry into Jerusalem underlines the kingship exercised by Jesus. The colt must be one upon which no one has sat, per Jewish ritual. Jesus is yet again put in a position to defend his disciples from criticism. Luke suggests that the true King and owner of all things will soon be revealed as the story of Jesus unfolds in Jerusalem.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 50:4-7

This reading offers us the third of the four oracles of Isaiah by the "Servant of the Lord," sometimes called the "Suffering Servant." This passage is deeply solemn. God has given him the word and he must deliver it, even at the cost of personal suffering. And he is confident that God will eventually prove him right. In exactly the same way, Jesus' passion was the outcome of his obedient delivery of the message of the kingdom despite his people's rejection, and his constant reliance that God would prove him right. The passion and death of Christ are not isolated events but of a piece with his whole ministry. The early Church was right in seeing that the servant songs came to rest in the passion and death of its Lord.

SECOND READING: Philippians 2:6-11

Today's Second Reading is often described as the "Christ hymn." Paul's poetic hymn to Christ captures both heart and imagination. Jesus, in human form, did not seize status; rather, he entirely emptied himself (kenosis) and in doing so his divinity is revealed. His death was not any death, but a heroic and transformative death that reveals his true nature. Now he is exalted by God and all can see him for who he really is – and believe. Paul wants us to have the same mind or attitude that Christ had for us. He reminds us to continue in obedience and allow God to work in our for God's good pleasure. Let us pray for one another this week, especially that we have the courage to show obedience to God, as we follow Jesus to the cross so that we might one day enjoy his resurrection.

GOSPEL: Luke 22:14-23:56



Luke's Passion narrative takes us through the events of the final days of Jesus. Jesus is a righteous figure, ready to embrace his martyrdom. Luke portrays Jesus as unafraid and resolute about the fate that lies before him. In many ways, this version of the Passion is a political drama: the priestly authorities succeed in getting their demands met, Pilate overplays his hand. Characters like Simon Cyrene and the two criminals add a vivid detail. Throughout, the message is that God's plan will be accomplished and the Messiah will be glorified. During this Holy Week, let us walk with Jesus on this journey, which will lead us toward a transformed life in God's Kingdom.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

Branches of palm, olive, or sometimes even budding willow are ancient symbols of victory and hope, as well as of new life. The procession celebrating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem overflowed with praise and excitement, as onlookers waved these triumphant branches and proclaimed their blessings. Yet, in a few days, they will cry "Crucify him!" The crowd's change of heart illustrates the problem of holding God to our expectations. The crowd expected a liberating leader, the Messiah, to free them from Roman oppression. Jesus instead takes up his Cross and invites us to do the same. Through his Death and Resurrection he is indeed a liberator, but from death and sin, not from Rome. But unable to see past their need, the crowd's disappointment turns into anger and a death order. As we enter Holy Week, Palm Sunday teaches us to let God be God, and to trust in God's wisdom not only to meet but shatter and exceed our expectations.

PASCHAL TRIDUUM

The Easter Triduum—which begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday, reaching its high point in the Easter Vigil, and closes with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday, is the summit of the Liturgical Year. It commemorates Christ's Paschal Mystery, i.e., the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus.





The Easter prayer Regina Coeli (“Queen of Heaven” in Latin) is a wonderful tribute to our Lord’s resurrection and to the Blessed Virgin Mary (pictured in her Coronation at left). Although its origins are unknown, it dates back to the 13th century. It is one of four antiphons (short liturgical texts sung or chanted, often as seen below, in a responsorial pattern) dedicated to Our Lady. It is often sung as a hymn and has had numerous musical settings in its original Latin text, including several by Mozart.

Traditionally, it is prayed standing, often at noon, in place of another well-known prayer, the Angelus, during the Easter Season from Holy Saturday until Pentecost.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia. / For He whom you did merit to bear, alleluia.

Has risen, as he said, alleluia. / Pray for us to God, alleluia.

Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia. / For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray. O God, who gave joy to the world through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Do You Remember Your First Encounter with God?

Do you remember your first encounter with God? This was a question that was asked by Fr. Joe on Sunday, February 6th, 2022. After listening to Fr. Joe’s homily, I reflected on his question and remembered my first encounter with God at the young age of five. I had always wanted to go to church with my dad and when I turned five, I was allowed to go. On the path to church, we always picked up Grandma Peg. Some of you may know her as Margaret Cooney or later in life as Peggy Allen. But to me, she was always Grandma Peg; a part of that first encounter with God that day. For years we would pick Grandma Peg up for mass until she passed away in January of 2000 after a brief stay at Broad Acres. As I disbursed ashes to the residents of Broad Acres this year, all I could think about was her and how this year would be significant for her as I donate the Paschal Candle this year in her memory. I may not have told her how much those Sundays meant to me, but they were important. She always sat to my right and sang each song each Sunday. As the candle of the Paschal Candle burns, may her memory burn in the hearts of those in her family as well as those she called her friends. This one is for you, Grandma Peg.



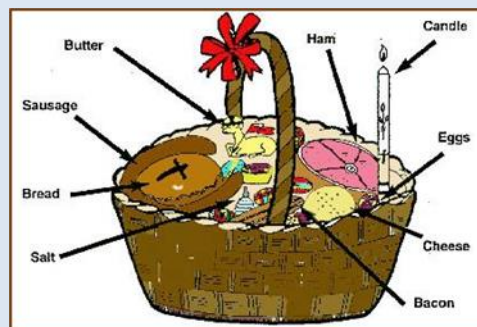
This year’s Paschal Candle has been donated by Alanna Huck in memory of her Grandmother, Margaret Cooney Allen.

BLESSING OF BASKETS

Baskets will be blessed on **Holy Saturday, April 16th at 12:00 noon in the parish center.** All parishioners are welcome to attend.

Items often found in the Blessed Easter Basket

The Christian significance of Easter is symbolized in the foods used for the Holiday feast. Baskets are lined with a white cloth and decorated with ribbons and greenery to symbolize Spring, renewal, and the Resurrection. Traditionally, the baskets would include: decorated hardboiled eggs (representing Christ’s Resurrection), lamb shaped butter or sugar (representing Christ as the “Lamb of God”), bread (symbolic of Jesus as the “Bread of Life”), ham (symbolic of great joy and abundance), sausage (symbolic of God’s favor and generosity), smoked bacon (symbolic of the overabundance of God’s mercy), some prefer lamb (representing Christ as the “Lamb of God”), salt (symbolic of prosperity and justice and to remind us “You are the salt of the earth”), cheese (symbolizes the moderation Christians should have at all times), horseradish & pepper (symbolic of the Passion of Christ and the bitter herbs of the Passover). A white candle is often inserted into the basket to represent Christ as the “Light of the World.” Lastly, the basket is cover with linen symbolizing the covering of Christ’s shroud.
