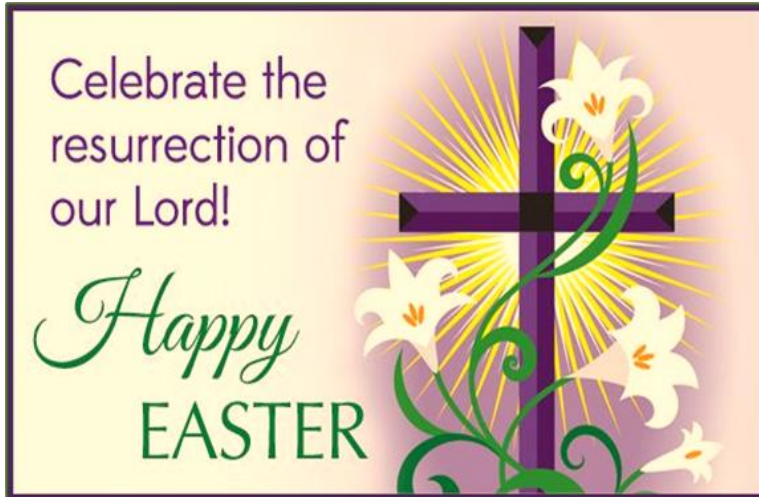

DIOCESAN UPDATE TO LITURGICAL PROTOCOLS

Bishop Bambera recently released updated liturgical protocols in response to the improved numbers of Covid-19 transmission rate within the 11 counties of the Diocese of Scranton. Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are no longer required to wear masks during Mass. The distribution of Precious Blood from the cup continues to remain suspended at this time. As always, if the number of positive cases surges in a specific county – or within a specific parish community in the future – mitigation measures may be reconsidered and reinstated.

Because many of our faithful have found great comfort in their priest or EMHC wearing a mask during the distribution of Holy Communion, Fr. Mosley will continue to wear his mask when he distributes the Eucharist. Anyone who is more comfortable with their minister wearing a mask, can simply come to his line to receive Communion.

CEMETERY SPRING CLEAN UP

Spring cleanup of the Pearl Street Cemetery will take place on Saturday, April 30th starting at 9:00am. We can use all the help we can get to beautify these sacred grounds. Bring your rakes, shovels, gloves, etc. **Note:** Remove all winter decorations from the cemetery prior to cleanup. Please do not dispose of the decorations on the cemetery ground, but instead take them with you to discard elsewhere.

Liturgical Reflection ~ Easter Sunday

FIRST READING: Acts 10:34, 37-43

The First Reading is taken from the speech that St. Peter gave when he was summoned to the house of Cornelius, a Roman centurion whom God led in conversion. Peter speaks of Jesus of Nazareth, anointed by God with the Holy Spirit, healed many people. He was put to death but was raised by God. He has sent us to preach this Good News: “Everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name.” Jesus commissioned the apostles to be his witnesses and to preach the good news to the nation. They were to continue the work of the prophets to proclaim the world of the Lord. The Good News could not and should not be contained, for it is meant for all time.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 118

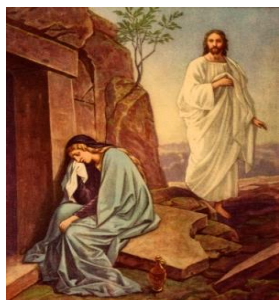
Psalm 118 speaks about power and mercy. These are not two ideas we would naturally associate, but it gives us an important insight into what mercy really is. We often think of mercy as something that is gentle and even weak, but true mercy is a strong and courageous virtue. God’s mercy is not a one-time-reality; it endures across the ages. God will protect those who believe, who are rescued through his power. The final verse, in which the rejected stone is mentioned, are recited by Jesus in reference to himself in the Gospel accounts of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Jesus, through his cross and resurrection, has destroyed the power of sin and death and brought us into his life. This truly is the day the Lord has made, and we cannot but rejoice.



SECOND READING: Colossians 3:1-4

In this passage from Colossians, we are reminded of the consequences of the Baptismal commitment we renew today. If we have died with Christ in order to rise with him, then we must live in a manner that is consistent with that choice. Our heart should be set on heaven. For those who are caught up in the things of this world, however, this reading is an invitation to reorder our lives. On the day of glory, the worldly things that can consume human hearts will have no significance.

GOSPEL: John 20:1-9



Mary Magdalene is the first person at the tomb in all four Gospel accounts. She is the first to give witness to the resurrection and is the messenger who then brings Peter and the Beloved Disciple to see the stone has been moved. There are not angels in this story to suggest that a body has inexplicably been raised. There are only cloths that lay on the ground, the head cloth arranged in a separate place, all to indicate that this is not the scene of a robbery. In those first moments, what it all means is unclear, and only the Beloved Disciple “saw and believed.” The Beloved Disciple is not named for, at one level, he represents all of us. Today we all run to the tomb to give witness to the resurrection of Jesus, our Lord, and our God.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

Easter Sunday marks the end of the Triduum and is the first day of the Easter Octave. The great 50 days begin. Forty days of fast yield to fifty days of feast. The Collect uses the important phrase “on this day.” Our participation in the liturgy on this day is our participation in the salvation won for us and made present for us; therefore, it is on this day that God, through his only begotten Son, has “conquered death and unlocked for us the path to eternity.” Therefore, we pray that “we who keep the solemnity of the Lord’s Resurrection” may rise to new life through the renewal brought by the Holy Spirit.



The Easter prayer Regina Coeli (“Queen of Heaven” in Latin) is a wonderful tribute to our Lord’s resurrection and to the Blessed Virgin Mary (pictured in her Coronation at left). Although its origins are unknown, it dates back to the 13th century. It is one of four antiphons (short liturgical texts sung or chanted, often as seen below, in a responsorial pattern) dedicated to Our Lady. It is often sung as a hymn and has had numerous musical settings in its original Latin text, including several by Mozart.

Traditionally, it is prayed standing, often at noon, in place of another well-known prayer, the Angelus, during the Easter Season from Holy Saturday until Pentecost.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia. / For He whom you did merit to bear, alleluia.

Has risen, as he said, alleluia. / Pray for us to God, alleluia.

Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia. / For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray. O God, who gave joy to the world through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

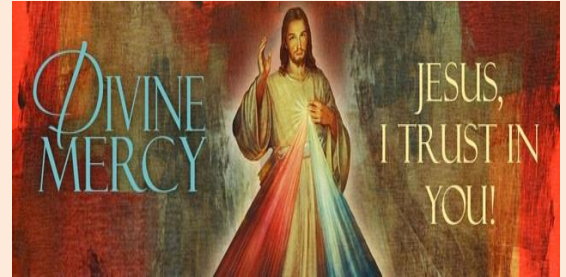

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

The Church offers a plenary indulgence for those who participate in Divine Mercy Sunday celebrations. Through a plenary indulgence, all temporal punishment due to sin is removed. In order to receive this indulgence, the following criteria must be met:

- The faithful must be in a state of grace at least at the time the indulgenced work is completed.
- The faithful must have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin.
- Make a sacramental Confession.
- Receive Holy Communion.
- Pray for the intentions of the Pope.

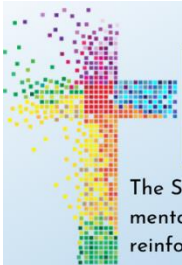


*It is sufficient that these sacred rites and prayers be carried out within several days (about 20) before or after the indulgenced act.

Confessions will be heard on Saturday, April 23 from 12 pm to 1 pm.
