Liturgical Reflection ~ 2nd Sunday of Easter FIRST READING: Acts 5:12-16

The First Reading speaks of the success of the early mission of the apostles. Even though people were frightened by what the leaders of the Jews might do to those who listened to or joined the disciples, they nevertheless recognized that the Lord was working through them. God would not allow humans to obstruct the spread of the Good News.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 118



As we sing this song of thanksgiving today, may its words help us to give voice to our Easter joy for there is nothing, not even death, which will put an end to the Lord's mercy? We celebrate the fact that Jesus took our sins upon himself and suffered and died for us. We did not deserve this, but God acted on our behalf and died for us what we could not do for ourselves. He has conquered sin and even death and this fills us with an incredible sense of gratitude.

SECOND READING: Revelation 1:9-13, 17-19

The Second Reading presents images take from the beginning of the Book of Revelation. John receives this vision on the Lord's Day, Sunday. John sees one who is like the Son of Man. He is wearing an anklelength robe with a gold sash. These are clothes that one would find on the high priest, for Jesus is our high priest. John reacts with fear, for he recognizes that he is in the presence of something very holy; something beyond his understanding. Jesus calms him and speaks of how he once was dead and now he is alive forever. He conquered death forever and offers us the gift of eternal life.

GOSPEL: John 20:19-31

The risen Christ greets his fearful disciples with peace, commissions them to carry on his mission, and breathes his forgiving and reconciling Spirit upon them. They are overwhelmed with joy. Thomas who was not present, refused to believe until he is able to see and touch Jesus for himself. A week later, Jesus appears and invites Thomas to see and touch. Thomas, overwhelmed by the risen Christ, makes one of the most profound belief statements ever by addressing Jesus as "my Lord and my God." Jesus proceeds to praise all those like ourselves, who have not seen and yet have believed.

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated on the Second Sunday of Easter. It is based on the private revelations of St. Faustina Kowalska, which recommended a particular devotion to the Divine Mercy.

In 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized St. Faustina and, during the ceremony, he declared: "It is important then that we accept the whole message that comes to us from the word of God on this Second Sunday of Easter, which from now on throughout the Church will be called Divine Mercy Sunday."

This is not a new solemnity of feast, nor does it celebrate a new or separate mystery of redemption, but rather, it leads into the continuing celebration of God's mercy during Eastertime and is not based solely on St. Faustina's revelations.Indeed, it is not primarily about St. Faustina — nor is italtogether a new feast. The Second Sunday of Easter was already a solemnity as the Octave Day of Easter. The title "Divine Mercy Sunday" does, however, highlight the meaning of the day.

The Divine Mercy image is a depiction of Jesus based on a vision that St. Faustina had in 1931. There have been a number of paintings made of this image. A basic explanation of the image is: Jesus is shown in most versions as raising his right hand in blessing and pointing with his left hand on his chest from which flow forth two rays: one red and one white. The depiction often contains the message "Jesus, I trust in You!" The rays streaming out have symbolic meaning: red for the blood of Jesus (which isthe Life of Souls), and pale for the water (which justify souls). The whole image is symbolic of charity, forgiveness, and love of God, referred to as the "Fountain of Mercy.



How is the Divine Mercy devotion linked to the Scripture readings for the SecondSunday of Easter? The Divine Mercy image depicts Jesus at the moment he appears to the disciples in the Upper Room, after the Resurrection, when he empowers them to forgive or retain sins. This moment is recorded in John 20:19-31, which is the Gospel reading for this Sunday in all three yearly Sunday liturgical cycles. This reading is placed on this day because it includes the appearance of Jesus to theApostle Thomas (in which Jesus invites him to touch his wounds). This event occurred on the eighth day after the Resurrection (John 20:26), and so it is used on the liturgy eight days after Easter.

PLENARY INDULGENCE

The Church offers a plenary indulgence for those who participate in Divine Mercy Sunday celebrations. Through a plenary indulgence, all temporal punishment due to sin is removed. In order to receive this indulgence, the following criteria must be met:

- The faithful must be in a state of grace at least at the time the indulgenced work is completed.
- The faithful must have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin.
- Make a sacramental Confession.
- Receive Holy Communion.
- Pray for the intentions of the Pope.

*It is sufficient that these sacred rites and prayers be carried out within several days (about 20) before or after the indulgenced act.

Immediately following the 8:30am Mass today, Sunday, April 24th, we will celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday with a blessing of the Divine Mercy Image, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Praying the Diving Mercy Chaplet and Benediction. The chaplet is also prayed daily at 3:00pm on EWTN.






By the essence of our Baptism, each person is called to take an active role in realizing the mission of the Vision 2030 Blueprint process. The laity, in an informed way based on data – and not simply emotion or sentimentality – must be directly involved in the process of creating vibrant parish communities rooted in the life of Jesus Christ. The participation of the faithful is not just to be invited and welcomed – but deemed critical. The laity and the clergy are co-responsible for the success of this mission. There must be equal participation and dialogue from all sides as this process moves forward.

The opportunities and challenges that the Diocese of Scranton faces are not unique to us alone. Many other dioceses are responding to similar circumstances. Locally, we must confront all situations that arise as a community of faithful disciples, relying on the Holy Spirit as our helper and guide.

The Vision 2030 Blueprint Process is not an outdated model of thinking of pastoral planning that should sit on a shelf, to be dusted off when situations arise. Instead, it should be a proactive initative focused on being as responsive as possible to the mission of the Church.

While change to parish life and structure will be necessary during this process, this planning process allows for the unique needs of each deanery and even special circumstances within each deanery, to be brought forward. Consultation among the clergy and the laity - as well as the formulation of specific recommendations - will take time.

While any change prompted by this process may be difficult, this process aims to help all of the faithful grow more deeply in our faith. The Church of Scranton will continue to be vibrant and build on its past. The current reality of parish life will need to look different in some communities.
