CARPORT ENTRANCE TO CHURCH CLOSED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

The carport entrance to the church will be closed until further notice due to a motor vehicle accident that occurred on Wednesday, July 13th. Significant damage occurred and we will not be able to use that entrance until repairs can be made. For weekend Masses only, the temporary handicap entrance to the church will be through the parish center side door; located just beyond the carport, next to the three, handicap parking spaces. The church can then be accessed through the music room. These doors will be open until Mass begins. As usual, once Mass begins, the side doors will be locked and the church will have to be accessed through the front doors. At the conclusion of Mass, you will be able to exit the church through the music room to the parish center side door. Those attending weekday Masses will enter and exit through the front door or parking lot side door. Thank you for your assistance as we await the repairs to the carport.

Liturgical Reflection ~ 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Isajah 66:18-21

This passage echoes a central theme of the book of Isaiah that Israel's God is the Lord of all nations. In this passage, written shortly after the return of the exiles from Babylon, we hear of how God will reach out to all the nations, as he is the God of all people upon the earth and he bring them to his holy city and make them part of his holly people.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 12

The psalm continues the theme found in the First Reading and the Gospel – God reaches out to the nations of the earth.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 12:5:7, 11-13

This reading, continuing from last Sunday, encourages the struggling faith community to "endure your trials as 'discipline'" from the Lord. They are to learn from their faith-filled struggles, for such discipline will later bring with it "the peaceful fruit of righteousness." No one seeks out suffering, but when accepted in fidelity to the Lord and worked through, it can become an occasion for drawing closer to God.

GOSPEL: Luke 13:22-30

Strive to enter through the narrow door. Luke 13:24

Someone asks Jesus, "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" Jesus responds first with the image of the narrow gate, clearly implying the challenge that salvation presents to all. Jesus' parable concerning the master, who refuses entrance to those who claimed special relationship with him, sends a clear message that no one should presume to enter God's banquet just because they claim a special, exclusive relationship with God. Entrance is based not on privilege or status, but rather on fidelity to God's ways manifested by care and concern for all. Jesus warns them that many foreigners and those faithful to God's ways will enter and recline at table in God's Kingdom, while they will

be shut out. Jesus was emphasizing that entering the kingdom is not a question of belonging to a certain group of people. It is a question of committing oneself to the kingdom, even if that costs all that one has. His final waying warns us that when he returns, we could find ourselves standing outside the narrow gate, watching a diverse group of other people pass into the kingdom of God.

SCHEDULING 2023 MASS INTENTIONS

Scheduling Mass intentions for 2023 is now open through the parish office, during regular business hours. **The following are the established guidelines for scheduling intentions:**

- One weekend Mass on each weekend must be celebrated for the intentions of the parish. This is required by Canon Law (c. 534). Because of this we only have one weekend Mass for which we can accept an intention. Due to this limited availability of weekend Masses, no family may schedule more than ONE WEEKEND MASS PER QUARTER, or four weekend Masses per year.
- There is no limit to the number of DAILY MASS INTENTIONS, including those Masses said at the nursing homes each month, which may be scheduled by each family.
- Canon 948 states, "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." Therefore, only one intention may be scheduled for any given Mass. However, for pastoral concerns to better accommodate the needs of the parishioners, we will adhere to the following: Up to three first names with the same last name (i.e., John, Paul, and Mary Smith) or two last names only (i.e., Scott and Smith Families) will be allowed per intention.
- The stipend given for a Mass intention is \$10. While we are willing to take requests over the phone, your Mass Intention will be not be scheduled until we are in receipt of your donation.
- Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and All Souls Day Masses are always for the individual intentions listed by parishioners on their envelope.
- The Sanctuary Candle, burning in memory or honor of someone, is available on a weekly basis with no limit to the number each family may reserve.

Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time

Saint of the Week St. Augustine

Feast Day—August 28

Very few men have had such an impact on Christianity as St. Augustine. He was born in AD 354 in North Africa, at that time a strong and dynamic Christian region. His father was a prominent pagan, but his mother, Monica, was a devout Christian. She intended that Augustine be baptized, but in his adolescence, he distanced himself from the Church and did not want to be baptized. He studied Latin literature and became a follower of an esoteric philosophy known as Manichaeism.

He had a mistress with whom he lived for fifteen years. She bore him a son, but he later broke off with her while living in Milan, where they had gone because he had been given a teaching position there. He found himself gradually more attracted to Christianity as he listened to the preaching of St. Ambrose, the bishop of Milan. But he resisted conversion, though his mother prayed persistently for him.

In a book entitled The Confessions, written in his later years as a spiritual and theological reflection on his life, Augustine describes the final steps to his conversion.

He had felt the tension between attachment to his sinful ways and attraction to Christ and the Gospel. One day in the year 386, he went crying into the garden of the house where he was staying with friends. He was weeping because of his inability to make a decision for conversion. But then he heard the voice of a child from a neighboring house singing the refrain, "Take it and read, take it and read." He picked up the Letters of St. Paul and read the first passage his eyes fell upon: "not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and licentiousness, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh" (Rom 13:13-14). Augustine recognized the grace of God in this reading and embraced conversion.

St. Augustine knew God's mercy in the forgiveness of sins gained for us by Jesus Christ. Today Catholics encounter this same mercy and forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance.


Prayer
