Parish News and Activities

Church Hours/Adoration

The church will be open for private prayer, Monday through Friday from 8:00am–5:00pm. Generally, all three doors leading into the church will be unlocked. If for some reason the front and carport doors are not open for entry, please use the door on the parking lot side of the church. Saturday, the church will be open from 8:00am–4:30pm using only the parking lot side door. The front and carport doors will be unlocked at 4:30pm for those attending Mass. All doors of the church will be unlocked on Sunday morning at 8:00am for those attending Mass. Adoration will take place on Tuesday from 1:00pm-6:00pm, with Benediction but no evening prayer.

CARPORT ENTRANCE TO CHURCH CLOSED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

The carport entrance to the church will be closed until further notice due to a motor vehicle accident that occurred on Wednesday, July 13th. Significant damage occurred and we will not be able to use that entrance until repairs can be made. For weekend Masses only, the temporary handicap entrance to the church will be through the parish center side door; located just beyond the carport, next to the three, handicap parking spaces. The church can then be accessed through the music room. These doors will be open until Mass begins. As usual, once Mass begins, the side doors will be locked and the church will have to be accessed through the front doors. At the conclusion of Mass, you will be able to exit the church through the music room to the parish center side door. Those attending weekday Masses will enter and exit through the front door or parking lot side door. Thank you for your assistance as we await the repairs to the carport.

Liturgical Reflection ~ 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Wisdom 18:6-9


The context for this passage from Wisdom is the tenth plague in Egypt, the killing of the firstborn as the Israelites celebrated their first Passover and the angel of death passed over the houses marked with the blood of the lamb. Trust in God's covenant promises and attunement to God's ways lead the Israelites to wait on the Lord with certain knowledge that God would act on their behalf, liberating them from Egyptian slavery. By routing their enemies, God remembered the people, heard their cries, and responded with love and compassion, thus glorifying them as God's special people. Yearly, the divine institution of Passover is celebrated to remember God's covenant fidelity to the people and their constant need to trust in and be attuned to God's ways.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 33

The Responsorial Psalm continues the wisdom teaching that God will bless those who trust in him. It is fitting to praise God, not because we are obliged to, but rather because praising God is the most rewarding thing that we can do. Our words of praise remind us of our dependence on God. We thus have confidence that he will respond to our every need.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

In this passage from the Letter to the Hebrews, faith is defined as the realization of what is hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. Abraham and Sarah are presented as an ideal example of people who hoped and trusted in God, not knowing where it would lead, or how it would turn out. They trusted when asked to leave home for a new promised land. They trusted when told that their descendants would be countless, even though they were both old and had no children. They even trusted when God asked them to sacrifice Isaac, their only hope for future progeny. They trusted because they had faith in God beyond this time and place, assured that God knows better than we limited human beings, and that faith in God would eventually lead to eternal dwelling with God. Sooner or later each of us will face that test, and we can only pray that God will give us the wisdom and courage to trust.



GOSPEL: Luke 12:32-48

Luke's Jesus counsels us to trust and not be afraid for the Father is pleased to give you the kingdom^I However, we are warned to be ready and vigilant, for we do not know the time or day when the master will return to hold us accountable. A simple life style, unattached to the goods of this world and striving always for heavenly treasure, is the best form of readiness, for where your treasure is, there also will your heart be. Jesus relates two parables that stress the need for vigilance in waiting upon the master's return. All are to be ready but disciples will be held to greater standards of accountability, since they have been entrusted with much. Any abuse will be punished while loving attention to and service of others will be greatly rewarded.

He founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882. He died August 14, 1890, at the age of 38 after serving in the Priesthood for 13 years. He was declared Venerable on March 15, 2008. A miracle was approved for his Beatification on May 27, 2020. Venerable Father Michael McGivney was beatified on October 31, 2020. His Feast Day is established as August 13th.

The Third Commandment



The Third Commandment calls us to keep holy the Sabbath day. For Christians, the observance of the Sabbath is transferred to Sunday, the day that Jesus rose from the dead. God, through the Church, obliges us to make Sunday holy by participation in the Eucharist and by our being prayerfully reflective as far as possible. Sunday observance fulfills the interior law inscribed in the human heart to render to God visible and public worship as a sign of radical dependence upon God and as gratitude for all the blessings we have received.

Every seven days, the Church celebrates the Easter mystery. This tradition goes back to the time of the Apostles. It takes its origin from the actual day of Christ's Resurrection. Sunday extends the celebration of Easter throughout the year. It is meant to be illumined by the glory of the Risen Christ. It makes present the new creation brought about by Christ.

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Saint of the Week St. Jane de Chantal

JANUARY 28, 1572 - DECEMBER 13, 1641 FEAST DATE: AUGUST 12

At 20, Jeanne-Francoise Fremyot of Dijon, France, married Baron Christophe de Rabutin-Chantal. They were happy, but after eight years she was widowed and left with four children. In 1604 St. Francis de Sales became her spiritual director, they collaborated on the founding of the Order of the Visitation of Holy Mary, designed for women unsuited for the more rigorous life of other religious communities. At her death there were about 80 Visitation convents. St. Vincent de Paul, a contemporary, called her "one of the holiest people I have ever met on this earth."
