Liturgical Reflection ~ 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Jeremiah 17:5-8

Today's First Reading is the first of a small collection of wisdom sayings. This one is both a blessing and a curse. Ancient peoples understood that as a blessing was spoken, it was already bestowed on its intended recipient. The same was true of a curse. Today's presentation is that God blesses those who trust in him, while those who trust in their own strength will be frustrated and cursed. Jeremiah uses an image that was very popular at the time of the Babylonian exile, that those who trust in the Lord are like trees planted by running water. They will never wither or fade, for the Lord will bet their strength. Those who rely upon their own strength, however, are doomed as we are incomplete in ourselves and can only flourish when we learn to rely upon the love of the Lord. God is our refuge always and our only hope in times of trouble.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 1

The Responsorial Psalm continues the wisdom theme found in the First Reading and uses the same imagery found in the reading from Jeremiah. Those who trust in the Lord are said to be like planted near running water. The wicked, on the other hand, will dry up and be lost. Those who are good will not have anything to do with the wicked. If we want to follow God, we must make choices to separate ourselves from certain things.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20

While everyone in this community acknowledged Jesus' death and resurrection, some deny the possibility of their ow resurrection from the dead. They believed that only spiritual realities had any value. They could not understand why anyone would want to return to one's body after one's death. Paul reminds then that if they deny the resurrection of the dead, then they are also denying the resurrection of Jesus . This is the core of our faith. To deny this is to deny who we are and what we are to be. Let us join with Paul in celebrating this wondrous mystery that is also our destiny.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:17, 20-26

Today's gospel reading is the beginning of what is often called the Sermon on the Plain. Its counterpart is Matthew's Sermon on the Mount. As these titles suggest, there are differences and similarities between these gospel readings. When spoken from the mountaintop in Matthew's Gospel, we can't miss the impression that Jesus is speaking with the authority and voice of God. In Luke's account Jesus teaches on level ground, alongside the disciples and the crowd. Luke presents Jesus' authority in a different light. He is God among us. Another distinction found in Luke's version is the audience. Luke's Beatitudes sound more personal than those in Matthew's.



There is also a difference in number: Matthew describes eight beatitudes; Luke presents just four, each of which has a parallel warning, a 'woe.' The Beatitudes are often described as a framework for Christian living. Our vocation as Christians is not to be first in this world, but rather to be first in the eyes of God. We are challenged to examine our present situation in the context of our ultimate horizon, the Kingdom of God. This Gospel should give us pause to reflect on where we stand. Do we take up our calling to be true prophets or do we close ourselves to the word of God and, in effect, become false prophets?

The Diocese of Scranton strongly recommends that all parishioners wear a mask while attending Mass, regardless of vaccination status. As Catholics, we have a responsibility to protect our friends and neighbors and mask wearing remains an important mitigation tool against community spread.

BISHOP BAMBERA TO CELEBRATE MASS AT ST. PETER'S ON FEBRUARY 20th

As part of a pastoral visit to Tioga County, Bishop Bambera will be the celebrant at the 8:30am Mass on February 20, 2022. All are welcome to attend and greet the Bishop following the Mass. We will livestream this Mass for those unable to attend in person.





Parishes are meant to foster lives of holiness and discipleship among all their people. The following are some examples of societal changes that have impacted the number of parishioners who actively support the mission of the Church:

CHANGING DEMOGRAPHICS

Many of the most faithful Mass-going parishioners continue to get older and while some young people are moving out of the area for employment, others are not actively attending Mass and practicing religious beliefs. In many parishes, the number of funerals far outpace the number of Baptisms taking place.

GENERATIONAL DIFFERENCES

According to the Pew Research Center, individuals who profess no religious affiliation, "nones," are now the largest subgroup in American society. In a study released in 2019, "nones" jumped from 17% of the adult population in 2009 to 26% in 2019. Catholics, meanwhile, slipped from 23% to 20% in 2019. While some young people embrace the concept of spirituality, they do not necessarily see the need for participation in Mass or the sacraments.

SADNESS AND PAIN

While the Church has always been a gathering of the wounded, it must acknowledge the sadness and pain caused by prior parish reconfigurations as well as the clergy sex abuse crisis. As acknowledged in Bishop Bambera's 2011 Pastoral Letter, "Wounded and Loved, Regathering the Scattered," we simply cannot embrace the hope of Easter without first experiencing Good Friday and the wounds of our lives and brokenness of our world.



2. Financial Challenges and Parish Infrastructure Needs

Many parish buildings were built in a different era and there are countless facilities with deferred maintenance needs and no planned funding stream for necessary repairs. The Diocese of Scranton must continue to evaluate where and how to best invest resources not only on a particular parish-level, but also the deanery and diocesan levels.

Parishes are much more expensive to maintain now than they were in the past. With a fewer number of parishioners supporting the mission of the church overall, parish offertories have not been able to keep up with current realities.

As of early 2021, 19 parishes have been found to have significant bills, insurance premiums, or medical premiums that need to be paid to the Diocese of Scranton. The Diocese of Scranton provides pastoral and temporal services for people, parishes and institutions in the Diocese and represents the faithful in the Diocese in the worldwide Church. Funding to help support the work of the Diocese itself is primarily provided through an assessment that is paid by each parish. Likewise, funding to help support the Diocese of Scranton Catholic School System is provided through a schools assessment that is paid for by each parish. The resources provided by both parish and school assessments are carefully used to further the mission of the Church.

ANNUAL APPEAL

The dioceses is offering a new donor initiative which provides a refund to parishes for reaching new donor goals. An increase of 10% in new donors results in a \$2000 refund to the parish. An increase of 5% in new donors offers a \$1000 refund to the parish. St. Peter's needs 31 new donors to meet the 5% increase and 49 new donors to meet the 10% increase. Any donation amount qualifies.
