

### Church Hours/Adoration

## Liturgical Reflection ~ 7<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

### FIRST READING: Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18

Scripture commentators refer to a section in Leviticus as the holiness code. Today's text is part of that section. It includes a series of injunctions for the people of the covenant beginning with the words, "You shall not" or "You shall." These commandments prescribe the way of life for God's people. The foundation for such a life is the holiness of God; holding of grudges among brother or sister or neighbor.

### RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 103

In the opening verse the psalmist reminds himself to praise the Lord lest he forget all the Lord's benefits. He names those blessings that come from the Lord and for which he is ever grateful: pardon for sin, healing of ills, redemption from destruction; all these are crowned with "kindness and compassion." He believes that the Lord abounds in mercy that is greater than all sins of his life. The Lord's graciousness is as vast as the space between east and west. It is as tender as the love of a father for his son.

### SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 3:16-23

Paul invokes the image of the Temple to greet the Christians in Corinth. They would certainly know of the Temple structure in Jerusalem, but Paul tells them that they are a spiritual temple. God dwells in them; they are the holy of holies. The indwelling of God is through the Spirit that they have received from Christ Jesus and the Father. Paul warns them about boasting among themselves; that will bring about dissension in the community. If that happens, the unity of the spiritual temple is destroyed.

### GOSPEL: Matthew 5:38-48


At the end of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus uses two more examples of the Mosaic Law to continue his new interpretation of the law. Both relate to difficult relationships that the disciples or any one might experience. They include relations with people who strike us, people who ask for help, and people we consider to be our enemies. This teaching is not one of the easier ones to accept; it calls on the disciples to rethink both the social customs of the time and the intent of the religious law. Jesus asks them, and us, to go beyond what might be an easy and spontaneous response to one that would be more compassionate and life giving.

## Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at [www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis](http://www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis). To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.




### Diocesan Annual Appeal



Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. You will notice a change in liturgy, decorations, and colors around the church. The priest will vest in violet, except on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday) when he wears the rose vestments. The sanctuary is bereft of flowers or any other decorations. The Gloria will not be prayed/sung on Sundays. Also, Alleluia is not sung or said from the beginning of Lent until the Easter Vigil.




## Lenten Reminders

**Days of Fast and Abstinence** – Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence (to abstain from eating meat). All Fridays during Lent are also days of abstinence. Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to abstain from eating meat.

All Catholics, 18-59 years of age, are bound by Church law to fast. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken, but not to equal one full meal.


**Easter Duty** – All parishioners are reminded of their obligation to fulfill their Easter Duty. A person's Easter Duty consists of receiving the Holy Eucharist at least once between Ash Wednesday and Pentecost Sunday as well as going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation to confess any mortal sins.




*"My flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51)*

All of the faithful in the Diocese of Scranton are invited to a Lenten Holy Hour with the Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, to commemorate the diocesan phase of the National Eucharistic Revival.

These gatherings will take place in each of the twelve deaneries of the Diocese of Scranton.

At their November 2021 General Assembly, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops voted to move forward with plans for a National Eucharistic Revival to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The multi-year Eucharistic Revival began on Sunday, June 19, 2022, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, and culminates with the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21, 2024.

Mark your calendars and plan on joining Bishop Bambera as we pray for renewal in our devotion to Jesus Christ present to us in the Eucharist.



## **What is a Holy Hour?**

*A Holy Hour is a period of time (usually around an hour) spent in prayer before our Lord Jesus Christ present to us sacramentally in the Eucharist. This involves silent personal prayer, meditation, readings from Sacred Scripture, hymns, spoken prayers and litanies, and can even involve popular devotions such as recitation of the Rosary or the Divine Mercy Chaplet. As Catholic Christians, there are many different ways to pray, and a Holy Hour is a great time to be in the very presence of Jesus and to pray in whatever manner is most fruitful for our spirituality.*

## **What is Eucharistic Adoration and Exposition?**

*Eucharistic adoration is praying before the Lord Jesus who is truly present to us in the Eucharist. This usually takes place during a period of Eucharistic exposition when a consecrated host, the Blessed Sacrament, is placed in a monstrance (from the Latin word meaning "to show"). This tradition in the Catholic Church began in the Middle Ages when the faithful did not feel worthy enough to consume Holy Communion at Mass. Instead, they would faithfully gaze upon the consecrated host as the great mystery of God's love revealed to us in Christ and offer their prayers. While the frequent reception of Holy Communion at Mass is encouraged today, the Church still considers this tradition of Eucharistic Adoration an indispensable part of Catholic faith and spirituality.*

## **What will happen during this Holy Hour with Bishop Bambera?**

*This Lenten Holy Hour with Bishop Bambera commemorates the diocesan phase of the National Eucharistic Revival in which the bishops of the United States hope to rekindle in Catholics a living relationship with the Lord Jesus in the sacrament of the Eucharist. The evening begins with Solemn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, followed by a period of silent, personal prayer and contemplation. Vespers, or Evening Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours, will then be offered with hymns, psalms and readings pertaining to the Eucharist. Bishop Bambera will give a homily on the Eucharist during Vespers, and the Holy Hour concludes with Benediction, or the Blessing of the Faithful with the Eucharist.*

## **Why should I go to this Holy Hour?**

*The word "Eucharist" comes from the Greek word meaning "to give thanks" and this season of Lent is the perfect time for each of us to recognize our own brokenness and to express our gratitude for God's grace manifested in the death and resurrection of Jesus. We are not alone on this Lenten journey: we join our prayers during these Holy Hours with the faithful all over the Diocese of Scranton, united with our Bishop, the Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, as well as Catholic all over the United States in praying for a renewal in our devotion to the Holy Eucharist.*
