Liturgical Reflection ~ 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23

Today's First Reading speaks of one of the several stories about political and military conflicts between David and Saul and challenges us to adopt a radically different sense of justice, one based upon mercy and not strict retribution. The reading recounts an episode from the life of David. God had chosen David to succeed Saul, and Samuel had anointed him as the next king. All that David did was successful. Saul had been anointed as kind of Israel, but he had sinned against the Lord and the Lord had rejected him. This caused Saul to be jealous and he sought to kill David many times. David could have killed Saul when he came upon him, but David would not kill the anointed of the Lord. David's respect for the king puts the matter in God's hands. This gives us a good example of how we can respond to those who do evil things to us. We can respond with forgiveness. God favors those who show justice toward others and faithfulness to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 103

The Responsorial Psalm reminds us that we have learned what mercy means from the way the Lord has treated us. God has redeemed us and crowned us with kindness and compassion. He is slow to anger. He has forgiven our sins. We seek the mercy and compassion of God.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:45-49

Today's Second Reading continues Paul's teaching on the resurrection of the dead, which we heard about 2 Sundays ago. Paul raises a very practical questions: "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body will they come back?" St. Paul uses the imagery of Jesus being a second Adam in this passage — *The first man, Adam, became a living being, the last Adam a life-giving spirit.* The first Adam, the first human created, is our forefather. He brought sin into the world. We have inherited this from him. The second Adam, Jesus, has brought life into the world. Unlike the first Adam, he was obedient to the command of his Father. While we have inherited our earthly nature and sin from the first Adam, we have inherited our spiritual nature and eternal life from Jesus. As we bear the image of Christ on earth, so will be bear the image of the risen Christ in heaven.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:27-38

Today's Gospel is a continuation of Luke's Serom on the Plain. Luke's Gospel has been characterized as being a Gospel of mercy and compassion. This passage demonstrates that, for in it Jesus calls us to base our human actions upon the call to mercy. It calls Christians to adopt the Gospel of love. Love is a choice of service to those who hate and hurt us. It cannot be motivated by what one will receive in return, but must be based upon the need of the other. We cannot refuse to love others because they do not deserve our love. We did not deserve to be loved and forgiven by God, and yet we received that mercy. We have to share that mercy with others. Jesus presents a goal. We must aim at that goal, realizing that it might take a lifetime for us to reach it. May our hearts be the exact reflection of God's heart of mercy, as we respond with compassion, just as we have received compassion from our loving God. "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." When we act in this radical way and forget about self-protection, God will give us such superabundance that we will not be able to contain it.

"Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

Stop judging and you will not be judged.

Stop condemning and you will not be condemned.

Forgive and you will be forgiven."

The Diocese of Scranton <u>strongly recommends</u> that all parishioners wear a mask while attending Mass, regardless of vaccination status. As Catholics, we have a responsibility to protect our friends and neighbors and mask wearing remains an important mitigation tool against community spread.

3. <u>Diminishing Number of Ordained Priests</u>


Over the coming decade and beyond, the Diocese of Scranton faces a decreasing number of priests. A fewer number of priests will represent a significant challenge to the entire diocese. Given the decline in people actively practicing their faith, there would naturally be fewer priests coming from our families. Changes will need to be prompted because of clergy retirement, infirmity or transfer.


The number of Diocesan priests in active ministry has decreased significantly over the last several decades. As indicated in the graph below, the Diocese of Scranton had more than 200 active priests in 2003. That number has consistently declined in subsequent years. In 2021, there were 97 diocesan priests active in the Diocese.

While various factors can influence any projections - including the number of seminarians ordained by the Diocese in the coming years - the following is of immediate concern:

- 16 priests are expected to reach the retirement age by 2025.
- 19 additional priests are projected for retirement between 2025-2030 (The retirement age is 75 in the Diocese of Scranton)
- Because of health conditions known in 2021, 6 priests may not be able to continue in ministry until their expected retirement age.

The feast of the Chair of St. Peter

On February 22nd each year, the Church celebrates the feast of the Chair of St. Peter. This might seem odd, as the church doesn't venerate furniture. There's no feast of the end-tables of St. Cyprian, or feast of the Sofa of St. Andrew. So, what's with the chair?

In pre-Christian Rome, the feast of *Parentalia* (celebrated in the third week of February) commemorated deceased relatives and friends, and it was traditional to leave an empty chair at the table in their honor. This empty chair has parallels in many other faiths, including Judaism. Christianity, in its early centuries, often established feasts and holiday that coincided with—and generally supplanted—the celebrations of the larger culture.

As early as the 4th Century, there is evidence of a Christian feast celebrating the Chair of Peter. The significance isn't the chair itself, but rather the authority it represents. The Latin word for chair, *cathedra*, is where we get the word cathedral. And when a pope speaks a pronouncement with his full authority as head of the Church, he is said to speak "*ex cathedra*" or, "from the chair." So, when we observe the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter, we're celebrating the office of the pope as the authoritative head of the Church.


As for St. Peter's original chair, it is represented in St. Peter's basilica in Rome by an elaborate sculpture by Bernini. The relics of the chair itself are in the Vatican treasury, and not on public display. Those relics were given to the Vatican in the year 875 by King Charles II of France.




