Liturgical Reflection ~ 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Isaiah 6:-1-2, 3-8

Today's readings continue the focus on the call to be ministers of God's word that we heard on the past two Sundays. Last week we heard about the call of the prophet Jeremiah. Today we proclaim a similar text about the call of Isaiah to his prophetic ministry. The call of Isaiah follows a familiar pattern. Isaiah has an encounter with the Lord, seeing a vision of the Lords' magnificence in his dwelling in the Temple. Transformed and inspired by that encounter, Isaiah offers himself enthusiastically in service of the Lord. Though Isaiah understands his own limitations, he trusts God and is purified for his mission of preaching God's steadfast love and mercy to a people in great need. When God says, "Whom shall I send?" Isaiah is able to say, "Send me!" Do we trust that God will ready us for the ministry of the Word?

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 138

The Responsorial Psalm continues the theme found in the First Reading. It is a celebration of the tremendous holiness of God. We cannot even begin to comprehend the greatness and glory of our God. Our human mind and experiences are limited, but God is not. Our only possible response to this encounter with the holiness of God is to praise the glory of God. We join in the hymn sung by the angels that proclaims the holiness of God.



SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Today Paul is teaching about the resurrection of the dead instead of spiritual gifts he has spoken about the past couple of weeks. Paul offers words of encouragement about what we've been taught, what we've embraced, and what has taken root in our hearts. Like Paul, all disciples are called to share the Gospel. The Gospel we are called to proclaim is quite simple: Jesus died for our sins and was raised from the dead so that we might share in eternal life. If we do not believe in this truth and live our lives formed by this belief, our preaching will be empty and useless. If the preacher is not formed by faith, the preaching will not be able to inspire, convert, and transform.





In both the Isaiah text and this Gospel, we hear a call story and reminds us that our call to ministry can come when least expected and in the very ordinariness of life. In each, the one called is overwhelmed, almost speechless, certain he's unworthy to be in the presence of the divine power that's calling and healing him at the same time. Today's Gospel recounts the calling of Jesus' first disciples. This call follows the familiar pattern. Having encountered Jesus and his preaching and having seen his glory in the miraculous catch of fish, Simon Peter, James, and John are transformed. They abandon the life they have known and begin to follow Jesus,

strengthened by the mission with which Jesus entrusts them. Simon Peter falling to the feet of Jesus and telling him that he is not worthy to be in Jesus' presence reminds us of Isaiah's reaction when he encountered God on his heavenly throne in today's First Reading. And then comes the call to ministry – "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men."

The Diocese of Scranton <u>strongly recommends</u> that all parishioners wear a mask while attending Mass, regardless of vaccination status. As Catholics, we have a responsibility to protect our friends and neighbors and mask wearing remains an important mitigation tool against community spread.

ANNUAL APPEAL

The dioceses is offering a new donor initiative which provides a refund to parishes for reaching new donor goals. An increase of 10% in new donors results in a \$2000 refund to the parish. An increase of 5% in new donors offers a \$1000 refund to the parish. St. Peter's needs 31 new donors to meet the 5% increase and 49 new donors to meet the 10% increase. Any donation amount qualifies.

World Day of the Sick

The Church celebrates the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes on Friday, February 11th. The Virgin Mary first appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous on this date in 1858 in Lourdes, France. Our Lady told Bernadette several messages; one being to drink from a spring near the grotto where she appeared. Bernadette scraped away some soil and the



spring began to trickle out. The spring still flows to this day and numerous pilgrims come to bathe in those waters in search of God's healing.

In connection to those healing waters of Lourdes, Pope John Paul II designated February 11th as World Day of the Sick to encourage the people of God, Catholic health institutions and civil society to be increasingly attentive to the sick and to those who care for them. In commemoration of this time of prayer, we will celebrate the sacrament of anointing of the sick during the 12:10 Mass on Friday, February 11th. Anyone who is in need of the healing touch of the Lord is invited to come to be anointed during this liturgy.

A lot has changed not only in society - but also in the Diocese of Scranton during its more than 150-year history. By working together, we hope to strengthen the most vibrant expressions of parish life and to embrace the unavoidable changes which require us to respond in new ways.

As members of the Church of Scranton, we must work together in a way that we best live out our baptismal calling in both a world - and local environment - that continues to change. We must continue to respond to the needs of the People of God with changing resources and opportunities.


The following are some of the factors that will prompt change and response in our parishes:

1. Fewer Parishioners Supporting the Mission of the Church

Long before the COVID-19 pandemic impacted parishes, regular weekend Mass attendance had been on the decline. As shown in the chart below, the total number of parishioners who are registered in all parishes of the Diocese of Scranton dropped by more than 16% between 2014 and 2020.

The total number of Baptisms, First Communions and Confirmations in the Diocese of Scranton also dropped during this time period.

In 2020, a custom demographics report from Mission Insite identified that there are more than 317,000 Catholic individuals within the 11-county geographic territory of the Diocese of Scranton. This gap between individuals who identify as Catholics, yet are not currently registered in a parish, is a challenge that must be addressed.
