

#### Church Hours/Adoration

## **Liturgical Reflection** ~ 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### FIRST READING: Isaiah 49:3, 5-6

Scripture commentators debate the identity of the "servant" in this passage. Is it the prophet Isaiah or is it the people of Israel? The text would seem to support both possibilities. In any case, the focus of the Lord's pronouncement is the mission of the servant. The mission is twofold. First, the people will be brought back to the Lord and returned from exile. Second, the servant will be a light to all the nations. In this latter case it seems that the servant is the people. All this the Lord will do; the servant will be an instrument of the Lord's salvation.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 40**

The opening cry of the psalmist that the Lord hear his plea is replaced by a song of praise because the Lord has heard him. As a faithful servant the psalmist realizes that the Lord desires more than ritual sacrifices. The Lord desires a deeper commitment that comes from the heart. When the servant is ready to make this commitment he can stand before the Lord and cry out: "Here I am Lord. I come to do your will." These words can be the mantra of all those who accept the role of servant before the Lord.

#### **SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:1-3**

As Paul begins his letter to the Corinthians he first establishes his identity and his authority to teach them. He states that he has been called by Christ Jesus, even though Paul never met Jesus in his public life. He takes on the identity of an Apostle, one who has the right to preach the Gospel of the Risen Lord. Just as he has been called, he tells the faithful that they too have been called to holiness by the same Lord. Paul's closing blessing for grace and peace is repeated in similar words in every Eucharistic celebration.




#### GOSPEL: John 1:29-34

The Gospel text is not a firsthand observation by John of the preaching of John the Baptist or of Jesus' baptism. Rather it is a report by the evangelist of that event and as such it carries theological insights of John as the Gospel writer. There is a clear call theme in the text. John the evangelist recognizes the Baptist's call by God to baptize as a preparation for the coming of the Messiah. In his Gospel account, John sees the

event of Jesus' own baptism as an indication that Jesus, the Son of God, was called by the Father to take away the sins of the world.

### **Know Your Catholic Faith**


The month of January is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus, which is celebrated on January 3. The first twelve days of January fall during the liturgical season known as Christmas which is represented by the liturgical color white — the color of light, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence (absolute or restored). The remaining days of January are the beginning of Ordinary Time, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time.




