

Church Hours/Adoration

The church will be open for private prayer, Monday through Friday from 8:00am-5:00pm. From 8:00-9:00am, the only entrance will be through the door on the main parking lot side. All doors of the church will be unlocked on Sunday morning at 8:00am for those attending Mass. Adoration will take place on Tuesday from 1:00pm-6:00pm, with Benediction but no evening prayer.

Liturgical Reflection ~ 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Isaiah 8:23-9:3

Isaiah recalls Israel's history when the northern tribes were conquered by the Assyrians and placed in exile. Their situation is described as "darkness" and their living conditions as being "in the land of gloom." Their eventual freedom is attributed to the intervention of God, who came to them as a light. The result of this freedom was "great rejoicing" and "abundant joy." The prophet compares their jubilation to the joy that happens when the spoils of the harvest are shared, and when those in slavery are given their freedom.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 27

The first verse is a declaration of praise of the Lord. The second is a petition to dwell with the Lord, and the third is an affirmation of confidence in the Lord. The Lord is addressed with three metaphors: light, salvation, and refuge. Each ascribes to the Lord both the desire and the power to take care of the psalmist and, by inference, all those who know the Lord. The petition to "dwell in the house of the Lord" could be understood to dwell in the embraced of the Lord.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

On more than one occasion Paul takes the Church in Corinth to task for the divisions that arise among them. Today's text is one example. Although Paul considers them brothers and sisters in the Lord, he still takes responsibility for their spiritual welfare and for the harmony that should be among them. He dismisses their bickering over whom they should follow by reminding them that it is Christ Jesus who has saved them. The Gospel he preaches is that of Christ; and that is what they are to follow.

GOSPEL: Matthew 4:12-23



Today's reading is Matthew's account of the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. One of Matthew's themes is the connection between Jesus' mission and that foretold by the prophets. He does this by quoting the Isaiah passage that was in the first reading. Jesus is presented as the Light for the nations. Now that John the Baptist has been arrested, Jesus takes up his ministry and calls the first four apostles. The immediate response of the four fishermen has become an example for every disciple who intends

to follow the Lord. The last lines of the Gospel announce the nature and scope of Jesus' mission.
