Liturgical Reflection ~ The Epiphany of the Lord FIRST READING: Isaiah 60:1-6

The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord is a celebration of the manifestation of divinity. Our first reading comes from the part of the book of Isaiah written after the return of Judean exiles from Babylon. There is reason for Israel to hope. The Lord shines upon the people. God is in their midst! A reversal of fortune is taking place. Jerusalem will no longer be insignificant among the nations. Now, other lands will depend upon Jerusalem for light. Jerusalem will see a variety of people streaming toward her: exiles returning home, as well as people from other lands, laden with rich gifts. God's promise is for us as well. May our hearts swell with joy at the realization of God's glory.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 72


Psalm 72 gives a description of the perfect king of Israel. He would be someone who was filled with wisdom like Solomon, as well as a great warrior who could enlarge the boundaries of Israel from sea to sea, an accomplishment of David, and someone who guaranteed justice in the land, especially to the poor. As with the First Reading, we hear that even the Gentile kings would recognize the splendor of that king's reign and come to pay him homage.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he speaks of Christ as the one who gathers all to share it the same promise, the same inheritance, making them members of the same body. God's plan reaches completion on earth, in which Jews and Gentiles equally participate in the culmination of God's plan for human salvation.


GOSPEL: Matthew 2:1-12

Matthew tells of the magi who observed a star that was believed to signal the birth of a king "at its rising," and they came to worship him. This manifestation of God by the star touches true seekers everywhere – even those on the fringes. When they entered Jerusalem asking for information about the newborn king of the Jews, their inquiry reached the ears of Herod who asked his own advisors about where this king was to be born, to which they replied Bethlehem. The visit of the Wise Men is tinged with foreboding danger, pointing to Jesus" Death and Resurrection. This feast with its star and arrival of the Magi, reminds us that God has a plan that is worked out in time, whether Biblical time or the time of our own lives.



THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

Today we celebrate that the child born in the darkness of night in a lowly manger is revealed as the manifestation of God. Christ is revealed in many ways: as Lord, as King, as the one in whom God is present and acts. All of these manifestations are lights that shine on Christ, revealing a deeper understanding of who he is. The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord has several themes. First, we have the wise men being guided through darkness by the light of



the star. Second, we have the star as a sign that leads the wise men to Jesus. Third, we have the manifestation of God to Gentiles, notjust Jews, pointing to the reality that Jesus came for all people. Fourth, we have the mystery that God does reveal his very self in human flesh.
