## **Liturgical Reflection** ~ The Baptism of the Lord

#### FIRST READING: Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

The First Reading comes from the beginning of the second section of the Book of the Prophet Isaiah. The people had suffered terribly during the war that led to the fall of Jerusalem and during their exile from their homeland. They wondered whether God would be angry at them forever. God would restore the good fortune of the people. God would bring the people of Israel back to their homeland. The good news was to be proclaimed on the mountaintops.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 104**

The Responsorial Psalm is a hymn of praise that proclaims the glory and power of God and celebrates the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus. Typical of this type of hymn, God is first proclaimed as the creator and ruler of all that exists. Not the least of all Gods works of power and beneficence is the fact that God created us. We are fragile creatures, but God loves and protects us.

#### **SECOND READING: Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7**

On this feast of the Baptism of Jesus, we hear about the "bath of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit" that we have received. This rebirth was not due to anything that we had done to deserve it. It was the gift of a merciful and gracious God. His Spirit dwells in our hearts. Baptism is an expression of our faith. Faith is a gift from God. We cannot do anything to earn that gift, yet once we receive it, we must respond to it by being baptized and living as children of God. We must live what Baptism signifies; spirit-filled lives of virtue.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 3:15-16, 21-22

The baptism scene of Luke is structured in a similar way to the first servant song. The scene commences with the voice of God addressing an audience, so Luke's account begins with John addressing the people about the imminent advent of Christ in their midst and of his mission. John emphasizes the difference between his baptism and the one that the Messiah will administer. John's baptism is an acknowledgement of sin and repentance, while Jesus' Baptism conveys the power of the Holy Spirit that will transform those who receive it in new birth in the Spirit. By the same token, one can receive cleansing fire and empowering only the gift the Spirit when one acknowledges one's sinfulness. God's Word proclaims Jesus and his divine status and relationship to God.



## The Baptism of the Lord

The Christmas Season comes to its close with the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, an event recorded in all four Gospels. To begin his public ministry, Jesus presented himself to be baptized by John. The idea that a sinless Jesus would undergo baptism does not seem to make sense. But Jesus' baptism did not have to do with forgiveness, but had to do with manifestation, as it publicly revealed Jesus' identity as the beloved Son of God. Jesus' baptism was necessary - not for Him, but for us. It is the feast that proclaims the Baptism that elevates believers to the status of sons and daughters of God.

## **Diocesan Annual Appeal**

At least once a year, Christians are reminded of Jesus" prayer for his disciples that "they may be one so that the world may believe" (see John 17.21). Hearts are touched and Christians come together to pray for their unity. The event that touches off this special experience is the *Week of Prayer for Christian Unity*.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has a history of over 100 years, in which Christians around the world have taken part in an octave of prayer for visible Christian unity. Traditionally the week of prayer is celebrated between 18-25 January, between the feasts of St Peter and St Paul. In the southern hemisphere, where January is a vacation time, churches often find other days to celebrate it, for example around Pentecost, which is also a symbolic date for unity.

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2022 was chosen by the Middle East Council of Churches – "We saw the star in the East, and we came to worship him" (Mt 2:2). More than ever, in these difficult times, we need a light that shines in the darkness and that light, Christians proclaim, has been manifested in Jesus Christ.

## **Prayer**



## Today, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord!

The origin and foundation of Christian Baptism is Jesus. Before starting his public ministry, Jesus submitted himself to the baptism given by John the Baptist. The waters did not purify him; he cleansed the waters. "He comes to sanctify the Jordan for our sake . . . to begin a new creation through the Spirit and water" (St. Gregory Nazianzen, Liturgy of the Hours, I, 634).


Jesus' immersion in the water is a sign for all human beings of the need to die to themselves to do God's will. Jesus did not need to be baptized because he was totally faithful to the will of his Father and free from sin. However, he wanted to show his solidarity with human beings in order to reconcile them to the Father. By commanding his disciples to baptize all nations, he established the means by which people would die to sin—Original and actual—and begin to live a new life with God.
