Liturgical Reflection ~ 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 30:10-14

God established his covenant with Israel to be a mutual expression of fidelity and love. It appears that God's people have disregarded the Lord's ways and preferred their own. Moses instructs them to renew their covenant commitment by returning to the Lord "with all your heart and all your soul." Love of the Lord and fidelity to the commandments are the essential elements of covenant relationship. These are not "too mysterious and remote for you." They are very near to you, easily accessible in your life's experience as they are "already in your mouths and in your hearts." All that is required is for each one to carry them out. The challenge for any disciple centers not so much on knowing what is right but on having the courage and strength to do what is right.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 69

In this psalm the psalmist calls out to God in a time of distress, for God is the only one who can help. The psalmist proclaims his trust in God, for he is absolutely sure that God will deliver him from all his difficulties.

SECOND READING: Colossians 1:15-20


Today's Second Reading is a beautiful hymn of praise and exultation of Christ. The early Church struggled to develop concepts that would explain who Jesus was. Here it calls him an icon of the Father, and presents Jesus as the Wisdom of God. Jesus is also the head of the Church and the firstborn from the dead. He brought about our justification with God through his death and resurrection, and he has provided us a way to live in that justification by giving us the Church. There is a new fullness in the universe that has been made possible only by the demonstration of Christ's great sacrifice of love.

GOSPEL: Luke 10:25-37

In the verses prior to today's reading, the seventy-two have been appointed for mission and have returned exhilarated from their work and are told by Jesus how fortunate they are to know all that they do about the coming of the kingdom. A scholar of the law "stood up to test" Jesus. Jesus turns the question on him and asks the scholar "what is written in the law?" Jesus affirms that the scholar has answered correctly, but the scholar presses Jesus for more answers and asks, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus proceeds to recount the parable of the Good Samaritan.



For Jesus, loving the neighbor as yourself is the criteria for assessing one's love of God. Jesus' parable brings his audience to a moment of insight and decision on "who is my neighbor?" The definition of neighbor as one who treats another with mercy, breaks down all artificial boundaries that divide us, and rests on the insight that we are to treat one another in the same fashion that God treats all creation. We are called to treat one another with mercy, no matter who the other is or what we think the other deserves. To love God is to treat one another with mercy, reconciliation, and love. What decision will you make?

National Eucharistic Revival

As Roman Catholics, we believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. This is to say that Jesus is truly and substantially present to us in the Sacrament of His Body and Blood. At the Last

Supper, on the night before he died, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples; commanding them to "Do this in memory of me (Luke 22:19)." The Church continues to follow this command whenever we gather to celebrate Mass. The priest, acting in the person of Christ during the Eucharistic prayer, invokes the power of the Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the very body and blood of Jesus. Do we realize how blessed we are to be called to this supper of the Lamb?



The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has voted to move forward with plans for a National Eucharistic Revival to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The multi-year Eucharistic Revival begins today, Corpus Christi Sunday, and culminates with the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21, 2024.

We want to begin this Eucharistic Revival in our parish by highlighting **Eucharistic Adoration** that takes place at Saint Peter's **every Tuesday from 8 am to 6 pm.** This is a time for us to silently come before the Lord, tell him exactly what is on our heart, and receive his tender care. If you have never been to adoration, I encourage you to come, spend some time with the Lord and rest awhile in his presence. We are always in need of more people to sign up to be adorers. If you are free during the day, please consider signing up for a time slot on the bulletin board in the back of the church. We want to ensure that this practice will be able to continue within our parish community.

Initial resources for the Eucharistic Revival, including the document issued by the USCCB concerning the Revival, *The Mystery of the Eucharistic in the Life of the Church*, can be found at <u>https://eucharisticrevival.org</u>. Additional Eucharistic Revival resources and events for the Diocese of Scranton are forthcoming and will be found on the diocesan website.

The Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" (*Lumen gentium* 11). May we all take this opportunity over these next two years to grow closer to our Lord who remains with us in the Eucharistic until the end of time.

Mass in Remembrance of Victims of Violent or Tragic Death

The Diocese of Scranton is offering the annual Mass in remembrance of victims of violent or tragic death. This Mass is offered for the families and friends of those who have died in tragedy, especially through murder, suicide, and accident.

The Mass is scheduled for **Thursday**, **July 28**, **2022**, **at 7:00 p.m. in Saint Peter's Cathedral**, **315 Wyoming**, **Scranton**. All persons who have lost a loved one through tragic and traumatic death are invited to this liturgy. The mass will be televised on CTV.

We ask that the names of deceased loved ones are registered on registration forms which are available in the parish office or on the Diocese of Scranton's website, www.dioceseofscranton.org. All forms must be received by July 22, 2022.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel

Celebrated July 16

Mount Carmel, which juts out into the Mediterranean near Haifa, Israel, has been considered a sacred place since the prophet Elijah built an altar there in his contest with the prophets of Baal. The Carmel headland is traditionally associated with the beginnings of the Carmelite order around 1195, when a group of lay hermits formed a community there. Mary had been honored there as early as the fifth century, and by the 12th century Mount Carmel had become a site of Marian devotion. The Carmelites chose Mary as their protectress and dedicated their oratory on Mount Carmel to her. Our Lady of Mount Carmel is the patron of Bolivia and Chile. This Marian feast became an optional memorial in the Revised Roman Calendar of 1969.
