#### Liturgical Reflection ~ 14<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Isajah 66:10-14

Today's passage comes from the last chapter of the book and proclaims an end to the nation's suffering a new beginning which promises to be fruitful. Isaiah speaks of the great joy that will be experienced by all as the Lord restores Jerusalem after the devastation of the Babylonian Exile. Not only will the physical city be transformed, but the people themselves will be a new creation upon their return to Jerusalem. The prophet announces that the power of the Lord will be evident to all, with joy and abundant life as its unimaginable manifestation. After years of suffering the people can look to the future with great hope.

### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 66**

Psalm 66 is a hymn of thanksgiving; both for what the Lord had done for the nation and for what he had done for the psalmist. God is both a God who guides the great events of history, and a God who is concerned with every individual. The psalmist calls upon all the nations of the earth to give praise to the Lord and cry out with joy.

### **SECOND READING: Galatians 6:14-18**


Paul asserts that the only thing any disciple can boast in is the Cross of Christ, the most degrading of deaths transformed into the ultimate symbol of God's love to all. As disciples, we too are called to manifest God's gracious love to all, no matter the cost. Whether circumcised or uncircumcised, Jew or Gentile, all are new creations in the Lord, who broke down any and all boundaries that divide us. Paul asserts that as disciples we all bear the marks of Jesus as we willingly give ourselves in service of others. All this is God's doing through the grace given to us in Christ.

## GOSPEL: Luke 10:1-12, 17-20

Luke's account of the commissioning shows Jesus appointing seventy-two disciples and sending them ahead of him to spread the word concerning God's reign. They are being sent as workers to a rich harvest that God has cultivated. However, they are also warned that such harvesting will involve dangers and challenges, concretized in the image of being sent out "like lambs among wolves." They will experience rejection and opposition. Jesus instructs them as to their behavior on such a mission, and insists that no matter what they encounter, they are to trust in God who will



protect and care for them. They return rejoicing at the great feats they are able to accomplish in God's name, as Jesus proclaims that with God's reign, Satan is defeated and his disciples have their names recorded in heaven. The seventy-two have gathered together a great harvest, but there is one to come that will be far greater!

# **National Eucharistic Revival**

As Roman Catholics, we believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. This is to say that Jesus is truly and substantially present to us in the Sacrament of His

Body and Blood. At the Last Supper, on the night before he died, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples; commanding them to "Do this in memory of me (Luke 22:19)." The Church continues to follow this command whenever we gather to celebrate Mass. The priest, acting in the person of Christ during the Eucharistic prayer, invokes the power of the Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the very body and



blood of Jesus. Do we realize how blessed we are to be called to this supper of the Lamb?

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has voted to move forward with plans for a National Eucharistic Revival to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The multi-year Eucharistic Revival begins today, Corpus Christi Sunday, and culminates with the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21, 2024.

We want to begin this Eucharistic Revival in our parish by highlighting **Eucharistic Adoration** that takes place at Saint Peter's <u>every</u> **Tuesday from 8 am to 6 pm.** This is a time for us to silently come before the Lord, tell him exactly what is on our heart, and receive his tender care. If you have never been to adoration, I encourage you to come, spend some time with the Lord and rest awhile in his presence. We are always in need of more people to sign up to be adorers. If you are free during the day, please consider signing up for a time slot on the bulletin board in the back of the church. We want to ensure that this practice will be able to continue within our parish community.

Initial resources for the Eucharistic Revival, including the document issued by the USCCB concerning the Revival, *The Mystery of the Eucharistic in the Life of the Church*, can be found at <u>https://eucharisticrevival.org</u>. Additional Eucharistic Revival resources and events for the Diocese of Scranton are forthcoming and will be found on the diocesan website.

The Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" (*Lumen gentium* 11). May we all take this opportunity over these next two years to grow closer to our Lord who remains with us in the Eucharistic until the end of time.

# Mass in Remembrance of Victims of Violent or Tragic Death

The Diocese of Scranton is offering the annual Mass in remembrance of victims of violent or tragic death. This Mass is offered for the families and friends of those who have died in tragedy, especially through murder, suicide, and accident.

The Mass is scheduled for **Thursday**, **July 28**, **2022**, **at 7:00 p.m. in Saint Peter's Cathedral**, **315 Wyoming**, **Scranton**. All persons who have lost a loved one through tragic and traumatic death are invited to this liturgy. The mass will be televised on CTV.

One of Western New York's most exquisite landmarks, Our Lady of Victory National Shrine and Basilica attracts visitors worldwide. Rivaling the great churches of Europe, the Basilica was built in 1926 as a gift of thanks to the Blessed Mother from Venerable Nelson Baker, a current candidate for sainthood whose final resting place is located within the church. Prominent features of the shrine include breathtaking paintings and marble sculptures, as well as the Father Baker Museum and OLV Gift Shop located in the lower level.
