Church Hours/Adoration

Liturgical Reflection ~ 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 20:10-13

The prophet finds himself in a terrifying situation: he is surrounded by whispered threats and violence, and his friends have become his enemies. But he refuses to be afraid, and instead turns to God. Jeremiah's tormented prayer is his sixth lament to God for his suffering. Taken cumulatively, these prayers seem to depict Jeremiah on the edge of despair. But the prophet does not rely on himself for rescue: he trusts in God, who walks with him. Even cries of pain are an expression of belief that God does hear those who grieve. Praise of God before the rescues occurs is surely a hope-filled prayer of confidence, even in the midst of suffering.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 69

Psalm 69 is the song of one whose obedience to God's will brings him only insult and danger. He prays to God for kindness, help, and mercy. The last verses call on all the "lowly ones" to do the same, trusting in God who hears their prayers.

SECOND READING: Romans 5:12-15

Paul contrasts Adam and Christ – sin and grace. Since Adam and Eve, sin has been inextricable from the human condition. The Mosaic Law did not take away sin, but rather made its presence more clear by measuring or "accounting" it. But with the coming of Christ, this pattern is broken forever, as grace overflows, healing the sin of the world. The grace of God is far more powerful than sin.

GOSPEL: Matthew 10:26-33

Jesus is continuing his instruction to his closest disciples, the Twelve, to prepare them for their mission. He has already told them he is sending them out as sheep among wolves. Jesus knows that his disciples will experience much of what Jeremiah experienced in today's First Reading: abandonment, persecution, fear. He reminds them to let nothing deter them from proclaiming the Kingdom of God.



Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.



Visiting Priest

Father Shinu Vazhakkoottahil is the Assistant Pastor at Epiphany Parish in Sayre, PA. Father Shinu represents the Diocese of Kottapuram in India, and he will be visiting St. Peter's Church the weekend of June 24th & 25th to celebrate Mass and to ask for our prayers and support of his mission.

He would like to share the following information with our parishioners:

We really appreciate your kindness in supporting our Diocese of Kottapuram, which is established in 1987 and comprises of 25000 families which means 100,000 catholic faithful. We would like to request your prayers and support in three areas.

- Formation of Our Seminarians. Our diocese is blessed with good vocations. Currently, we have 106 priests in our diocese who are working in and around the world. We have 23 major seminarians who are studying philosophy and theology and 34 minor seminarians. Our major expenses are for the formation of the seminarians which come almost \$1200 for each seminarian per year and these huge expenses are met with the generous help which is rendered by people like you.
- Housing Projects. Our diocese is made up of small islands and we have monsoon rains from June to November every year. But the last three years our monsoon season was fierce and life threatening, it rained for weeks together and there is a massive flood and land sliding that resulted in the death of thousands of people, the houses are destroyed and many of our dear ones are lost and it is a difficult situation. The government helps of course, but its very slow so that our diocese have the responsibility to look after our people. We do not have insurances and other supportive system in our place, so people have lost everything literally. The fund that we raise here is mainly to help our people.
- Social Service Department. Our mission is mainly carried out through our Social Service Department since our geographical area is largely coastal where people work in areas like fishing and other unorganized sectors like masonry, carpentry etc. They find it very much difficult to meet their livelihood and education of their children.
- The major thrust area of our Social Service Department is the empowerment of women, children, Differently Abled and Elderly.
 - ✓ Women are empowered though training and income generation activities such as such as: Screwpine craft, Water Hyazinth Craft, Cage Fish Culture, Paper Bag Making Units, Star Making Units, Organic Farming etc.
 - ✓ There are many projects directed toward the development of children and youth such as:
 - 1. "Poomottukal" (meaning "Flower Bud") which are the Self -Help Groups for children and youth where they perform mutual support and sharing to grow to become able citizens
 - 2. Vacation camps with Personality Development and Talent Search Programs
 - 3. Communicative English, Soft Skill, Yoga and computer literacy classes
 - 4. Participatory health and hygiene campaigns
 - 5. Regular sponsorship for studious children from the poor families
 - 6. Sponsorship of education of children of cancer patients and those children affected with cancer
 - 7. Free entrance coaching classes to get in to medical and engineering fields
 - ✓ We have also started a project called SNEHAMRITHAM which means a gentle touch to cancer patients since Cancer has become one of the leading causes of death at our place.
 - ✓ We have Elderly groups which we call SAYAM PRABHA and found it to be very effective to improve their mental health.
 - ✓ Right now, we are giving training and employment to many Differently Abled people especially woman and found that their self-esteem became very high when they were engaged in work.

The burden of running all of these institutions falls on the shoulder of the diocese. I request your prayerful support and financial assistance to continue all the good works we do.
