Liturgical Reflection ~ 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: 1 Kings 19:16, 19-21

The Lord chooses Elisha as a successor to Elijah's prophetic ministry. God commands Elijah to anoint Elisha as his successor. Elijah carries out the Lord's command by throwing his cloak over Elisha's shoulders, as a sign that he is handing over the mantle of prophecy to the younger man. Elijah's somewhat harsh response to Elisha's desire to say farewell to his family touches upon the tension existing between total commitment to the Lord's work and familial and social responsibilities. Elisha demonstrates his total commitment to God's call by sacrificing the oxen used for farming and feeding the people with it. Severing all ties and leaving all behind, Elisha manifests total commitment to God by becoming Elijah's attendant and future successor.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 16

This psalm is a psalm of trust in the God. Trust is essential, for both the First Reading and Gospel invited the disciples, and all of us, to leave everything we have to follow God. We all have things that we hold on to, but we cannot grasp them and embrace God. God promises to be our refuge and we will be filled with joy and surrounded by the delight of our God.

SECOND READING: Galatians 5:1, 13-18


Paul reminds us that in Christ we were set free from slavery to our own selfish ways and desires in order to "serve one another through love." Paul echoes Christ's words in summing up the whole law in the command to love your neighbor as yourself. This letter makes it clear that Christian freedom is freedom to love, not freedom to live according to worldly desires. Self-indulgence of this sort prevents one from following the dictate to live. Paul's distinction between Spirit and flesh deals with our decision either to accept the freedom to love given to us in Christ, or to reject it and live immersed in our slavish, selfish desires. How will you choose?



GOSPEL: Luke 9:51-62

Today's Gospel reading opens with a new section in Luke where Jesus suggests that is ministry in Galilee is complete that he is now prepared to make his final journey to Jerusalem where his mission and ministry will be accomplished. Being rejected by Samaritans along the way is an indication of the kind of reception that he will receive in Jerusalem. However, that does not stop Jesus from continuing his journey, nor does it prevent him from inviting others to follow him. Jesus' harsh words toward those desiring to follow him are not intended to be taken literally,

but are a way of expressing the importance of committing everything to the Lord, as did Elisha in the first reading. Jesus is saying that nothing must stand in the way of one's commitment to God's path. One needs to pay attention to family and social responsibilities, but they cannot become obstacles to or prevent one from committing oneself to building and establishing God's Kingdom. Each of us is called to follow Jesus. Salvation is to be received with complete devotion to God's reign.

National Eucharistic Revival

As Roman Catholics, we believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. This is to say that Jesus is truly and substantially present to us in the Sacrament of His

Body and Blood. At the Last Supper, on the night before he died, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples; commanding them to "Do this in memory of me (Luke 22:19)." The Church continues to follow this command whenever we gather to celebrate Mass. The priest, acting in the person of Christ during the Eucharistic prayer, invokes the power of the Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the very body and



blood of Jesus. Do we realize how blessed we are to be called to this supper of the Lamb?

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has voted to move forward with plans for a National Eucharistic Revival to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The multi-year Eucharistic Revival begins today, Corpus Christi Sunday, and culminates with the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21, 2024.

We want to begin this Eucharistic Revival in our parish by highlighting **Eucharistic Adoration** that takes place at Saint Peter's <u>every</u> **Tuesday from 8 am to 6 pm.** This is a time for us to silently come before the Lord, tell him exactly what is on our heart, and receive his tender care. If you have never been to adoration, I encourage you to come, spend some time with the Lord and rest awhile in his presence. We are always in need of more people to sign up to be adorers. If you are free during the day, please consider signing up for a time slot on the bulletin board in the back of the church. We want to ensure that this practice will be able to continue within our parish community.

Initial resources for the Eucharistic Revival, including the document issued by the USCCB concerning the Revival, *The Mystery of the Eucharistic in the Life of the Church*, can be found at <u>https://eucharisticrevival.org</u>. Additional Eucharistic Revival resources and events for the Diocese of Scranton are forthcoming and will be found on the diocesan website.

The Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" (*Lumen gentium* 11). May we all take this opportunity over these next two years to grow closer to our Lord who remains with us in the Eucharistic until the end of time.

In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551).

About the shrine:

One of Western New York's most exquisite landmarks, Our Lady of Victory National Shrine and Basilica attracts visitors worldwide. Rivaling the great churches of Europe, the Basilica was built in 1926 as a gift of thanks to the Blessed Mother from Venerable Nelson Baker, a current candidate for sainthood whose final resting place is located within the church. Prominent features of the shrine include breathtaking paintings and marble sculptures, as well as the Father Baker Museum and OLV Gift Shop located in the lower level.
