

# **Church Hours/Adoration**

The church will be open for private prayer, Monday through Friday from 8:00am–5:00pm. From 8:00-9:00am, the only entrance will be through the door on the main parking lot side. From 9:00am-5:00pm, the front door and carport entrance will be open. If for some reason the main door is not unlocked, please enter through the parking lot door, as this entrance will always be open from 8:00am-5:00pm, Monday through Friday. Saturday, the church will be open from 8:00am–4:30pm using only the parking lot door. The front and carport doors will be unlocked at 4:15pm for those attending Mass. All doors of the church will be unlocked on Sunday morning at 8:00am for those attending Mass. Adoration will take place on Tuesday from 1:00pm-6:00pm, with Benediction but no evening prayer.

# Liturgical Reflection ~ 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Lent

#### FIRST READING: Exodus 17:3-7

Today's reading continues the account of Israel's journey from slavery to freedom in the Promised Land. The Israelites are upset with Moses because they are without water, and fear dying in the desert. Moses calls out to God for help. God answers Moses telling him to strike a rock and water will flow from it. "I will be there in front of you," promises God. God is faithful to his promise and the Israelites are saved. The reading ends with a question "Is the Lord in our midst or not?" The answer is given in the Gospel. God always goes before us in our lives, struggles and journeys. God wait for us – ready to meet us and show us his power, love and care.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 95**

The psalmist issues a fivefold invitation to praise, "Come let us sing...let us acclaim...let us come...let us bow down...let us kneel." The image of God echoes the First Reading; God is the "Rock of our salvation." Here one imagines a great rock, one that speaks of strength and security, something one could depend on to be in place forever. Such is the role of the Lord in the life of the people.

#### SECOND READING: Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

The Second Reading reinforces the conviction that Christ died for us sinners and now waits for us, resurrected in glory, to provide us with new life. Paul explains that we are saved by our faith, rather than by our obedience to the Law. Paul came to believe that no human effort, including observing the Law of Moses, could bring about a state of uprightness before God. Human justification could be accomplished only by means of an unearned gift of God. Christ gave his life for us as a gift of love to secure our justification.

#### GOSPEL: John 4:5-42

Today's reading presents an encounter with Jesus which abounds with Old Testament references, layers of meaning, and unfolding insight into Jesus' true identity of God's self-revealing Word made flesh. John indicates an implied call in every encounter with Jesus: whoever engages with him and so comes to believe is thereby commissioned to bring others to Jesus, so he can reveal himself to them. A woman of Samaria would seem a most unlikely candidate for an encounter with Jesus, because Samaritans and Jews avoided each other. John presents her as the first missionary, the only person to whom Jesus directly identifies himself as the Messiah, and the one who first proclaims him to non-Jews. Jesus becomes the source of new life for the woman and she becomes an evangelist, bearing the news that she has found the Messiah.



#### Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline 1-800-932-0313 (ChildLine) at or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis . To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

# FOOT WASHERS NEEDED

According to the Gospel, Jesus performed a final act of service for his Disciples, following the Passover meal. Arising from the table, He tied a towel about His waist and filled a basin with water and one after another He washed the feet of each disciple. When he finished, he said to them, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do".

In the Church, the foot washing ceremony is an important call for all people that they too should be willing to serve others. Following the homily at the Holy Thursday Mass, members of the congregation sit and have their feet washed by the priest, who plays the role of Christ. One by one, the priest will wash the participant's feet with a basin and a towel. It is a reminder that we are of the Body of Christ and as such, and as His followers, we too are called to serve others in a spirit of humility. And we are to do so, even if we do not feel the desire to do so. As Christians, this is our duty.

Twelve volunteers are needed to have their foot washed at the Holy Thursday Mass. A sign-up sheet can be found on the handout table on the side of the church.

### Cross Carrying Walk for Jesus

 A Cross Carrying Walk for Jesus is scheduled to take place in Wellsboro on Good Friday, April 7th, at 10:00am.
 Participants are asked to meet in front of the Wellsboro Chamber of Commerce that morning at 9:50am.

The cross will be carried along the sidewalks of Wellsboro to the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterian Church, and the United Methodist Church. A brief prayer, devotional, song, or meditation will take place at each location. Songs will be sung along the way and participants will take turns carrying the cross.

On Saturday, April 8<sup>th</sup> at 3:00pm, flowers will be placed on the cross for the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. On Easter there will be additional flowers available to be placed on the cross. Flowers from home are also welcome.

### Volunteer Opportunity – Collection Counters Needed

# LENTEN CORNER

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. You will notice a change in liturgy, decorations, and colors around the church. The priest will vest in violet, except on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday) when he wears the rose vestments. The sanctuary is bereft of flowers or any other decorations. The Gloria will not be prayed/sung on Sundays. Also, Alleluia is not sung or said from the beginning of Lent until the Easter Vigil.
