# Liturgical Reflection ~ 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent

#### FIRST READING: 1 Samuel 16:1, 6-7, 10-13

In the chapter preceding today's reading, the judge and prophet Samuel announced to the reigning king, Saul, that God has rejected him as ruler because of his disobedience. At the Lord's command, Samuel turns to Jesse, father of the one chosen to succeed Saul. David is chosen and anointed as King. He is the youngest of Jesse's sons and considered the least eligible for this important role. Yet, the reading reminds us that "not as man sees does God see, because...the Lord looks into the heart." As the chosen one of God, David prefigures Jesus the Christ – the Anointed one of God.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 23**

The "Good Shepherd" psalm is surely one of the most beloved passages of the Bible. The psalmist uses the very familiar image and role of a shepherd to identify the Lord and to describe the intimate relationship that the Lord has with his people, the sheep of his flock. Like the shepherd, the Lord is protector, provider, and nurturer.

#### **SECOND READING: Ephesians 5:8-14**

This passage begins by emphasizing an appeal to the Church made in the preceding chapter: you have been given a new kind of life through Christ's self-giving love; now you must live that life! Using images of darkness and light, the author repeats the point that Christians are now "light in the Lord" and so must live in that light, which produces right living of every kind. The light that comes from God illuminates our sight, thought, choices, and behaviors. The reading ends with a plea taken from an early hymn again calling believers to accept new life in Christ, the true source of light that illumines the Church's thought and action.

#### GOSPEL: John 9:1-41

The contrast of darkness and light underscores both the healing and the teaching of Jesus about who is Spiritually blind and who can truly see. The encounter between Jesus and the man born blind, confronts the religious thinking of the crowds and the religious leaders. It becomes the way for Jesus to expose them to see if their faith is ready to accept him. When the man regains his belief in the "Son of Man," like the Samaritan woman, he becomes the bearer of Good News, if only the others can see it.



#### **Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor**

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at <a href="https://www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis">www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis</a>. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

#### **FOOT WASHERS NEEDED**



According to the Gospel, Jesus performed a final act of service for his Disciples, following the Passover meal. Arising from the table, He tied a towel about His waist and filled a basin with water and one after another He washed the feet of each disciple. When he finished, he said to them, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

In the Church, the foot washing ceremony is an important call for all people that they too should be willing to serve others. Following the homily at the Holy Thursday Mass, members of the congregation sit and have their feet washed by the priest, who plays the role of Christ. One by one, the priest will wash the participant's feet with a basin and a towel. It is a reminder that we are of the Body of Christ and as such, and as His followers, we too are called to serve others in a spirit of humility. And we are to do so, even if we do not feel the desire to do so. As Christians, this is our duty.

Twelve volunteers are needed to have their foot washed at the Holy Thursday Mass. A sign-up sheet can be found on the handout table on the side of the church.

#### **Cross Carrying Walk for Jesus**

A Cross Carrying Walk for Jesus is scheduled to take place in Wellsboro on Good Friday, April 7th, at 10:00am. Participants are asked to meet in front of the Wellsboro Chamber of Commerce that morning at 9:50am.

The cross will be carried along the sidewalks of Wellsboro to the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterian Church, and the United Methodist Church. A brief prayer, devotional, song, or meditation will take place at each location.

Songs will be sung along the way and participants will take turns carrying the cross.

On Saturday, April 8<sup>th</sup> at 3:00pm, flowers will be placed on the cross for the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. On Easter there will be additional flowers available to be placed on the cross.

Flowers from home are also welcome.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. You will notice a change in liturgy, decorations, and colors around the church. The priest will vest in violet, except on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday) when he wears the rose vestments. The sanctuary is bereft of flowers or any other decorations. The Gloria will not be prayed/sung on Sundays. Also, Alleluia is not sung or said from the beginning of Lent until the Easter Vigil.

# 33 Days to Merciful Love

33 Days to Merciful Love journeys with one of the most beloved saints of modern times, **St. Therese of Lisieux**, and concludes with a consecration to Divine Mercy.



St. Therese was declared a Doctor of

The Church by St. John Paul II, because she had developed a specific spirituality that is recognized as something new and important for the Church. This book hones in on that spirituality, and how it connects with Divine Mercy. Therese made a consecration to Divine Mercy which she calls her Offering to Merciful Love, which is really the culmination of her whole spiritual teaching on her Little Way. Fr. Gaitley thinks this is the most powerful form of consecration to Divine Mercy, and understandably so, since it made her such a great saint in such a short time (24 yrs.).

Her Offering to Merciful Love is based on her profound insight that the Heart of Jesus is full of mercy, and he longs to pour out that Merciful Love on we sinners. Therese realized that sinners often close their hearts to the Lord's great mercy, and their rejection actually causes Jesus deep suffering. So for the purpose of consoling the Heart of Jesus, Therese asked the Lord to pour into her soul all the mercy rejected by others - and He did. That experience set her on fire with Merciful Love, so that everything she did, no matter how small, was done for love of Jesus.

So whether you want to deepen your love of Divine Mercy or have a devotion to St. Therese, *33 Days to Merciful Love* is the book to transform you.
