# **DIOCESAN COVID UPDATE TO** LITURGICAL PROTOCOLS

Bishop Bambera recently released updated liturgical protocols in response to the improved numbers of Covid-19 transmission rate within the 11 counties of the Diocese of Scranton. Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are no longer required to wear masks during Mass. The distribution of Precious Blood from the cup continues to remain suspended at this time. The faithful are asked to reverence the Cross with either a bow or a genuflection, instead of kissing or embracing the Cross on Good Friday. As always, if the number of positive cases surges in a specific county - or within a specific parish community in the future - mitigation measures may be reconsidered and reinstated.

Because many or our faithful have found great comfort in their priest or EMHC wearing a mask during the distribution of Holy Communion, Fr. Mosley will continue to wear his mask when he distributes the Eucharist. Anyone who is more comfortable with their minister wearing a mask, can simply come to his line to receive Communion.

## Liturgical Reflection ~ Third Sunday of Lent FIRST READING: Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15

This Sunday's First Reading continues the presentation of important moments in salvation history as we hear the story of Moses and the burning bush. Moses has a typical reaction when he encounters the presence of God. He is attracted to the burning bush. When we experience the Holy, we want to draw near. As Moses arrives, he realizes the Holy also creates a sense of fear, awe, to be in the presence of God. Moses asks God what his name is, to which God answers, "I AM."

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 103**


The Responsorial Psalm is filled with words that describe the caring and compassionate attitude that God demonstrates to the people of Israel and to us. This fills us with a sense of awe, for God's kindness and generosity are truly beyond our comprehension. God has put aside our guilt and surrounded us with mercy and love.

#### SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Today's Second Reading is Paul's reflection on another part of the Moses story, specifically the Israelites time in the desert during the Exodus. Paul reminds the people of Corinth that every gift from God carries responsibility. If God has revealed his love and goodness to us, then we must respond appropriately. Paul speaks of how the people of the Old Testament received God's revelation. They experienced a prefiguring of the sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist. Yet they rejected God and sinned, and for this they were punished. Paul shares with the Corinthians the consequences that were suffered by the Israelites in the wilderness as examples so that the community will not desire these evil things. We have to ask ourselves how much more is the Christian community responsible, since what they received was not a prefiguring of the sacraments, but the actual sacraments themselves.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 13:1-9

The Gospel recalls the theme found in the Second Reading today, that those who have received God's grace are responsible for what they have received and focuses on repentance. Lent is a season when we are invited to honestly examine our lives and to remove anything that keeps us from loving God and neighbor from our hearts. It is not to be squandered, for we do not know how much time we have to turn to the Lord's ways. The parable found at the end of the reading also reminds us that Lent is a time to dig around our roots and fertilize them (with the word of God, prayer, penitential practices, reception of the Sacraments, etc.) so that, even if we have not really borne fruit yet, we might still have a chance to do so. We cannot let our past failures paralyze us; we must courageously use every opportunity for growth that God provides us. The message of the parable is that God is a God of second chances for those who are willing to repent.





# **Parish Lenten Service Project**

CV Closet at Cowanesque Valley High School was founded just over a year ago. It originated as a way to aid in meeting the hygiene and personal needs of students. CV Closet is an in-house, free "store" to provide students with clothing, bedding, and hygiene items. Students themselves maintain inventory, facilitate "thank you's," and generally take care of the CV Closet.

The students who run this store want fellow classmates to feel comfortable asking for help and to feel comfortable taking what they need. To do this, they set up two "grab and go" tables in two different areas of the school. The items on these tables are showcased like store displays and are changed regularly. They also have an actual room in the high school, deemed CV Closet. This houses the more personal items someone might need, as well as acts as storage.

The mission is more than helping students meet physiological needs. It is about building relationships and building a culture of taking care of each other and a culture of acceptance. The students bring their own items to donate. They help each other "shop." The faculty, staff and students believe this has positively impacted the culture of their school.

Our parish will be collecting items for the CV Closet UNTIL APRIL 3<sup>rd</sup>. If you would like to donate, drop-off bins will be located in the back of the church. Below is a list of items that are needed for the CV Closet.

# 3. Promote vocations to the Priesthood, Diaconate and Consecrated Life

The clergy and lay faithful must be dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education and to renewing our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. As a diocese, pastoral care of vocations should shape our activities and be at the heart of diocesan pastoral planning.

As we embrace hope amidst change, we must create a culture of vocations by focusing on the following areas:

- Intentionally focusing on increasing vocations to the priesthood as well as the diaconate and religious life
- Joyfully celebrating the Sacraments, most especially the Eucharist, so each parishioner has a connection to a priest who serves them
- Making prayer for vocations essential throughout all of parish life
- Working on behalf of vocations involves encouraging individual young men to consider serving the Lord and His people as a priest.
- Celebrating and promoting the recruitment of seminarians at the parish level





# **Lenten Reminders**

Days of Fast and Abstinence – Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. All Catholics, 18-59 years of age, are bound by Church law to fast, which means only one large meal and two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together should not equal another full meal, unless dispensed or excused. Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to abstain, which means no meat may be eaten. Note: This year, the Feast of the Annunciation falls on Friday, March 25. 2022. Because it is considered a solemnity by the church, the law of abstinence from meat and meat products does not apply specifically on Friday, March 25<sup>th</sup>, this year (per Canon 1251.)

**Easter Duty** – All parishioners are reminded of their obligation to fulfill their Easter Duty which consists of receiving Holy Communion at least once between Ash Wednesday and Pentecost Sunday as well as going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation to confess any mortal sins.

## FOOT WASHERS NEEDED



According to the Gospel, Jesus performed a final act of service for his Disciples, following the Passover meal. Arising from the table, He tied a towel about

His waist and filled a basin with water and one after another He washed the feet of each disciple, except Judas, who had already departed to betray Him. When he finished he said to them, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

In church, the foot washing ceremony is an important call for all people that they too should be willing to serve others. Following the homily at the Holy Thursday Mass, members of the congregation sit and have their feet washed by the priest, who plays the role of Christ. One by one, the priest will wash the participant's feet with a basin and a towel. It is a reminder that we are of the Body of Christ and as such, and His followers, we too are called to serve others in a spirit of humility. And we are to do so, even if we do not feel the desire to do so. As Christians, this is our duty.

Twelve volunteers are needed to have their foot washed at the Holy Thursday Mass. A sign up sheet can be found on the handout table on the side of the church.

The Church encourages us to make confession a regular part of our spiritual life, especially during the holy season of Lent, as we reflect on our baptism and repentance. Bishop Joseph C. Bambera is helping to make this experience possible by arranging for a Lenten initiative called *The Light Is On for You*. **Every Monday evening during Lent**, each parish throughout the Diocese of Scranton will have their lights on for confession so that Catholics can come to or return to this incredible source of God's grace, mercy, and healing. **Due to Fr. Mosley's responsibility for St. Thomas Parish**, <u>the schedule for</u> <u>St. Peter's will be March 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>, and April 4<sup>th</sup> from</u> <u>5:00-6:30pm</u>.

Bishop David L. Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, former chairman of the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), offers "10 Things to Remember for Lent":

**1. Remember the formula.** The Church does a good job capturing certain truths with easy-to-remember lists and formulas: 10 Commandments, 7 sacraments, 3 persons in the Trinity. For Lent, the Church gives us almost a slogan—Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.

2. It's a time of prayer. Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.

**3. It's a time to fast.** With the fasts of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, meatless Fridays, and our personal disciplines interspersed, Lent is the only time many Catholics these days actually fast. And maybe that's why it gets all the attention. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hot dogs? Beer? Jelly beans?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.

4. It's a time to work on discipline. The 40 days of Lent are also a good, set time to work on personal discipline in general. Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends, and coworkers."

**5.** It's about dying to yourself. The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control—it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die. The suffering and death of Christ are foremost on our minds during Lent, and we join in these mysteries by suffering, dying with Christ and being resurrected in a purified form.

6.Don't do too much. It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but

it's best to keep it simple and focused. There's a reason the Church works on these mysteries year after year. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.

7. Lent reminds us of our weakness. Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.

8. Be patient with yourself. When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. "What a bad person I am!" But that's the wrong lesson. God is calling us to be patient and to see ourselves as he does, with unconditional love.

**9. Reach out in charity.** As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering, or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.

**10. Learn to love like Christ.** Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.
