### DIOCESAN UPDATE TO LITURGICAL PROTOCOLS

Bishop Bambera recently released updated liturgical protocols in response to the improved numbers of Covid-19 transmission rate within the 11 counties of the Diocese of Scranton. Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are no longer required to wear masks during Mass. The distribution of Precious Blood from the cup continues to remain suspended at this time. The faithful are asked to reverence the Cross with either a bow or a genuflection, instead of kissing or embracing the Cross on Good Friday. As always, if the number of positive cases surges in a specific county – or within a specific parish community in the future – mitigation measures may be reconsidered and reinstated.

Because many of our faithful have found great comfort in their priest or EMHC wearing a mask during the distribution of Holy Communion, Fr. Mosley will continue to wear his mask when he distributes the Eucharist. Anyone who is more comfortable with their minister wearing a mask, can simply come to his line to receive Communion.

# Liturgical Reflection ~ Fourth Sunday of Lent

## FIRST READING: Joshua 5:9, 10-12

The theme of the readings for this Fourth Sunday of Lent is an invitation to celebrate the transition to a new state in life or a renewed relationship with God. The First Reading continues the series of readings on the important moments of salvation history that we have heard about over the past few weeks. This week we hear the first celebration of the Passover in the Promised Land. This is a moment of celebration, for the people could now grow their own crops and depend upon their own efforts to provide for their needs and not have to depend upon the manna that the Lord provided. God reconsecrated the people of Israel. It is a new time for God's people. The manna that sustained them in the wilderness was no longer needed because they could eat the Passover from the produce of their own land.

## RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 34

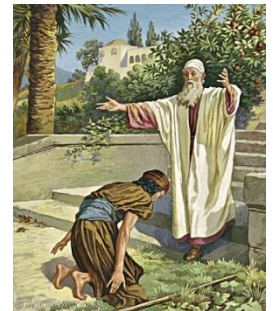
The Responsorial Psalm is a celebration of God's goodness. We have been given an opportunity during Lent to turn back to his ways. That is an experience that should fill us with joy. Lent is not a time for grief and gloom. It is a season of renewal and rebirth. We are given two choices in the Psalm; we can blush with shame if we refuse to use this Lenten season well, or we can look to God with faces that are radiant with joy. God is always willing to hear our call, but we have to be willing to call out.

## SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:17-21

The Second Reading continues the theme of renewal. We hear that Christ died so that we might be reconciled to God. Jesus paid the price for our sins. Paul says that Jesus became sin, meaning that he took the curse of our sins upon himself. He put the old ways of selfishness and alienation to death. Now we have to choose life and love. Paul and his colleagues served as ambassadors of Christ in the sense that they carried on his mission. As ministers of reconciliation today, are we willing to do the same?

## GOSPEL: Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

The Gospel presents the beautiful parable of the Prodigal son. It is easy to take this story for granted, for we have heard it so often. The parable is above all the story of the boundless love of a Father, who offers his repentant child the gift of reunion and unconditional reconciliation. The prodigal son, in his anxiety over conversion, in his longing to return to the family home and be forgiven, represents those who long for reconciliation on all levels and without reserve. The parable spotlights the older son's selfishness. In his jealousy he chooses to stay outside the party. This reminds us of the need for a change of heart and mind through the rediscovery of the Father's mercy, the need for laying aside misunderstanding and hostile feelings. The older son is an incentive to look inside ourselves and consider to what extent we may block the unity and reconciliation in the family. Each one of us at the same time is prodigal son and older brother. How joyful will we be if our greatest enemy is pardoned by God? True love does not rejoice in bad things that happen to others, but rather only rejoices in the good.



## LENTEN SERVICE PROJECT

### Parish Lenten Service Project

CV Closet at Cowanesque Valley High School was founded just over a year ago. It originated as a way to aid in meeting the hygiene and personal needs of students. CV Closet is an in-house, free "store" to provide students with clothing, bedding, and hygiene items. Students themselves maintain inventory, facilitate "thank you's," and generally take care of the CV Closet.

The students who run this store want fellow classmates to feel comfortable asking for help and to feel comfortable taking what they need. To do this, they set up two "grab and go" tables in two different areas of the school. The items on these tables are showcased like store displays and are changed regularly. They also have an actual room in the high school, deemed CV Closet. This houses the more personal items someone might need, as well as acts as storage.

The mission is more than helping students meet physiological needs. It is about building relationships and building a culture of taking care of each other and a culture of acceptance. The students bring their own items to donate. They help each other "shop." The faculty, staff and students believe this has positively impacted the culture of their school.

## Lenten Reminders

**Days of Fast and Abstinence** – Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. All Catholics, 18-59 years of age, are bound by Church law to fast, which means only one large meal and two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together should not equal another full meal, unless dispensed or excused. Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to abstain, which means no meat may be eaten. **Note:** This year, the Feast of the Annunciation falls on Friday, March 25, 2022. Because it is considered a solemnity by the church, the law of abstinence from meat and meat products does not apply specifically on Friday, March 25<sup>th</sup>, this year (per Canon 1251.)

**Easter Duty** – All parishioners are reminded of their obligation to fulfill their Easter Duty which consists of receiving Holy Communion at least once between Ash Wednesday and Pentecost Sunday as well as going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation to confess any mortal sins.

## FOOT WASHERS NEEDED



According to the Gospel, Jesus performed a final act of service for his Disciples, following the Passover meal. Arising from the table, He tied a towel about

His waist and filled a basin with water and one after another He washed the feet of each disciple, except Judas, who had already departed to betray Him. When he finished he said to them, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

In church, the foot washing ceremony is an important call for all people that they too should be willing to serve others. Following the homily at the Holy Thursday Mass, members of the congregation sit and have their feet washed by the priest, who plays the role of Christ. One by one, the priest will wash the participant's feet with a basin and a towel. It is a reminder that we are of the Body of Christ and as such, and His followers, we too are called to serve others in a spirit of humility. And we are to do so, even if we do not feel the desire to do so. As Christians, this is our duty.

**Twelve volunteers are needed to have their foot washed at the Holy Thursday Mass. A sign up sheet can be found on the handout table on the side of the church.**
