Liturgical Reflection ~ First Sunday of Lent

FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 26:4-10

Today's First Reading is taken from the part of the Book of Deuteronomy knows as the Deuteronomy Law Code. The code covers a wide range of topics from food regulations, tithing, rules for kings, priests, and prophets, to penalties for infractions against others and rules for marriage, divorce, and adultery. This section focuses on the on the firstfruits offered to the Lord that were given in gratitude for the good that God poured into their lives daily. After handing the basket of firstfruits to the priest in charge, the Law Code prescribed that the people make a declaration in God's presence of their journey from slavery in Egypt to freedom. Moses speaks to the people and tells them of the deep memory they are to retain. The wandering in the desert does not erase memory; it burns it into each heart the truth that God hears our cry and responds with abundance. Our job is to return those gifts generously. The firstfruits are evidence that they have indeed arrived and now dwell in the promise land.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 91

The Responsorial Psalm contains the saying that Satan would quote when he was tempting Jesus in the desert: "For to his angels he has given you a command about you, that they guard you in all of your ways. Upon their hands they shall bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone." The irony of Satan quoting this saying is that it is contained in a psalm that professes a radical trust in God. The psalmist speaks of God being his refuge and his fortress. Satan uses the saying to try and tempt Jesus away from trusting God; to get Jesus to create a situation where he forces God to rescue him. This would not be an act of trust, but a form of manipulation, which one does not do if one truly trusts and loves another.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 10:8-13

Today's Second Reading discusses the nature of righteousness that comes from faith. Following Jesus requires the same assent of heart and mind that was asked of Israel in the original covenant. Paul argues the need to both "believe" and "confess" in order to be saved. It is not enough to assent in our hearts to the mysteries of Christ; we must also be willing to proclaim those truths. And proclamation is not just a rote recitation of facts, it is a declaration that we have committed our lives to those truths, that we will live them with integrity, that we will not be satisfied with lip service and would even give our lives for them. Belief in Christ, Paul tells us, is transformative. It not only eliminates the distinctions between "Jew and Greek," but also changes us form mere speakers to committed does of God's Word. When what we speak with our lips and believe in our hearts turns into concrete action on behalf of others for the sake of Christ, then our salvation is manifest.

GOSPEL: Luke 4:1-13

The Gospel for today depicts Jesus having his own desert experience. The forty days in the wilderness is intended as a reminder of the forty-year sojourn of the Israelites in the Exodus. The temptations mark a moment when Jesus can purify the intentions for his public ministry. He is not going out into the world to gain fame or power. He is preaching and healing in order to obey the will of the Father. The story of the temptations of Jesus is a pointed reminder of the mystery of the Incarnation. Like us, Jesus was human. Like us, he could be tempted to indulge his appetites, find satisfaction in the material, act in grandiose ways, and abuse power. All of these Jesus resisted. He has nothing to prove. Jesus has placed himself entirely in God's hands. Luke



presents a real man engaged in genuine struggle with a real adversary. His unwillingness to be seduced thwarts Satan. How might this example be translated into our own human lives?

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY



The First Sunday of Lent is always the account of the temptation of Jesus from one of the Gospel accounts. The forty days of Lent correspond to Jesus' own forty days spent in the desert. For him, it was a period of preparation for his coming mission. At the end of the forty days Jesus had three encounters with the Evil One where Jesus was tempted to compromise his mission during his public life. The world, the Kingdom that Jesus came to build, has a different set of values altogether, and it is those values we will be considering all during Lent. Many Christians are chasing the idols of wealth, status, and power, but in fact, these are non-Christian, even anti-Christian, ambitions. They are not the

way of Jesus or the way of the Kingdom, and not the way to a fully human, fully satisfying life for anyone. Lent is a time of reflection reevaluation of the quality and direction of our lives. It's a time for reconsidering our priorities, to re-affirm our conviction of the equal dignity of every single human person. For us, too, the battle against evil never stops. The selfishness, the greed, the anger and hostility, the jealousy and resentment, above all the desire to have rather than to share, to control rather than to serve, will continually dog us. That is why we need this purifying period of Lent every year. Let it be a second spring in our lives. Let it mean something in our discipleship with Christ.

Lenten Reminders

Days of Fast and Abstinence - Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. All Catholics, 18-59 years of age, are bound by Church law to fast, which means only one large meal and two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together should not equal another full meal, unless dispensed or excused. Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to abstain, which means no meat may be eaten. Note: This year, the Feast of the Annunciation falls on Friday, March 25. 2022. Because it is considered a solemnity by the church, the law of abstinence from meat and meat products does not apply specifically on Friday, March 25th, this year (per Canon 1251.)

Easter Duty – All parishioners are reminded of their obligation to fulfill their Easter Duty. A person's Easter Duty consists of receiving Holy Communion at least once between Ash Wednesday and Pentecost Sunday as well as going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation to confess any mortal sins.

The Church encourages us to make confession a regular part of our spiritual life, especially during the holy season of Lent, as we reflect on our baptism and repentance. Bishop Joseph C. - Promoting and encouraging each young person to have a personal relationship with Jesus. This can be done in many ways through the guiding principles of Word, Worship, Community and Service. Some examples include: strengthening Eucharistic Adoration opportunities or other parish prayer opportunities geared to young adults at times that are convenient, holding faith formation opportunities for single young adults, performing parish service projects in conjunction with area non-profits and simply asking young men and women to take part in parish life activities
- Promoting strong marriages and healthy families with the goal of making each household in the parish a vibrant domestic church
- Inviting young adults to have a voice in parish ministries, for example, personally inviting young married couples to share their witness to those couples who are newly engaged
- Simply taking the time to make youth and young families feel welcome. Take time to notice the single young adults when they attend Mass. At the end of Mass, include them in conversations and activities.
