Liturgical Reflection ~ 2nd Sunday of Easter FIRST READING: Acts 5:27-31, 40-41

The Acts of the Apostles continues to tell the story of the spread of the Gospel in the days following the Resurrection and the Ascension of Jesus. This Sunday we again hear of the Apostles and the ongoing conflict with the Sanhedrin. To keep them from preaching about Jesus, the authorities had the Apostles jailed. But an angel of God secretly released them during the night and ordered them to resume their preaching in the Temple area. The authorities puzzle over how these men escaped locked cells, but the Apostles are convinced God is directing their fate. That is why, after this second arrest, they dare to defy the Sanhedrin and insist they must obey God, rather than men. Beaten and warned to keep silent about Jesus, the Apostles go forth rejoicing, not because they are free, nor because they narrowly escaped death, but because they were found worthy to suffer for the sake of Christ.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 30

The hope of a future resurrection is found only in some of the latest parts of the Old Testament and is absent from the psalms. When the psalmist speaks of being brought up from the netherworld and restored to life, he is using metaphorical language to describe deliverance from earthly troubles. But Christian apologetic, followed by liturgical piety, interpreted the psalm Christologically— the "I" who speaks becomes Christ, and the deliverance becomes his resurrection.

SECOND READING: Revelation 5:11-14

The Book of Revelation shifts from extolling the creator to unfolding the story of the plan of salvation. The vivid depiction of the heavenly liturgy finds all in the universe raising its voice to the glory of God. John's message is clear: Christ is not a victim; he is a victor reigning at the right hand of God. He is the source of life and those who give themselves to him, no matter what trials they must endure, will conquer death with him and find eternal reward in his Kingdom.

GOSPEL: John 21:1-19

The third appearance of the Risen Christ happens at the seashore. Again, the Lord is encountered in meal fellowship. Notice how the three affirmations demanded of Peter are parallel to his three denials before the Crucifixion. Peter and the others will be called to powerfully shepherd the flock, even though it will be to the death. Peter's death is referenced in the stretching out of hands. Not only will Peter follow Jesus as shepherd of the flock, he will also follow him to the glory of martyrdom for the sake of his sheep.



MARY'S MANTLE CONSECRATION

All parishioners of St. Peter's and Holy Child churches are invited to participate in Mary's Mantle Consecration beginning on Friday, May 13th and ending on Monday, June 27th. This consecration is designed for busy people and can be done in a way that suits your needs and lifestyle. The heart of the program is the Rosary, along with a brief daily meditation and a weekly day of fasting. Participants will receive daily emails and are encouraged to share their thoughts and prayer requests with the group.

Mary's Mantle Consecration is a journey of 46 days, ending on the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help (June 27th.) The number 46 refers to the stars on Mary's cloak, or mantle, in the image of our Lady of Guadalupe. 
"The first thing we need to discern and discover is this: Jesus wants to be a friend to every young person. This discernment is the basis of all else. In the risen Lord's dialogue with Simon Peter, his great question was: "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" (Jn 21:16). In other words, do you love me as a friend? The mission that Peter received to shepherd Jesus' flock will always be linked to this gratuitous love, this love of friendship." (Pope Francis, *Christus Vivit*, no. 250)

Fact of Faith

The Paschal Candle

The paschal candle is the symbol of the *light of Christ, rising in glory,* scattering the darkness of our hearts and minds. Above all, the paschal candle should be a genuine candle, the pre-eminent symbol of the light of Christ.

The paschal candle has its proper place either by the ambo or by the altar and should be lit at least in all the more solemn liturgical celebrations of the season until Pentecost Sunday, whether at Mass, or at Morning and Evening Praver. After Easter Time the candle should be kept with honor in the baptistery, so that in the celebration of Baptism the candles of the baptized may be lit from it. In the celebration of funerals, the paschal candle should be placed near the coffin to indicate Christ's undying presence, his victory over sin and death, and the promise of sharing in Christ's victory by virtue of being part of the Body of Christ (see Order of Christian Funerals, no. 35). The paschal candle should not otherwise be lit nor placed in the sanctuary outside Easter Time.



Saint of the Week

Damien of Molokai 1840-1889 Feast Day–May 10

Born in Tremelo, Belgium, Joseph de Veuster left school at 13 to work on the family farm. Six years later he joined the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, taking the name Damien. He volunteered for a mission to the Hawaiian Islands and was ordained in Honolulu in 1864. He served on the island of Hawaii for eight years, then volunteered in 1873 to work at the leprosy colony on Molokai (leprosy is now called Hansen's disease). Father Damien was priest, doctor and counselor to 800 patients before he contracted the disease in 1884. He stayed on Molokai, ministering until a month before his death. Considered a model and martyr of charity, he was canonized in 2009.
