

Liturgical Reflection ~ 5th Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING: Acts 14:21-27

Today's First Reading tells of Paul and Barnabas as they worked to spread the word of God, while enduring hardships along the way. Paul and Barnabas remained undeterred by the hostility that they have faced, and continue to preach the message of Christ throughout the region and were able to secure many followers for Christ. They have visited Lystra before and Paul left it barely alive: his healing of a cripple was used by enemies to persuade the people to stone him (Acts 14:8-20). Now he's back; not for revenge but to ensure his recent converts are growing and thriving. Very few of us will ever be arrested for being Christians, but we will all have a price to pay if we truly give witness to our faith in word and deed. Paul and Barnabas attribute all the credit to the Grace of God as he was the one who "had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles." God has opened that door for us, as well.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 145

I will praise Your Name forever my King and my God! The Responsorial Psalm is a hymn of praise and speaks to God's kingdom. God's kingdom is not a particular place or time, but exists wherever God's law is obeyed and his love revealed. God does not reign through terror and rage, but by conquering our hearts with his love. He is the king of our hearts. This is a message that all should hear until the very end of time, for God's dominion endures through all generations.

SECOND READING: Revelation 21:1-5

The vision of a "new heaven and a new earth" comprises the final scene of the Book of Revelation. John's visions culminate with a vision of the "new Jerusalem." From out of heaven he sees a new reality descending; it is the new and glorious Jerusalem, the eternal city of everlasting peace that looks like a bride perfumed and adorned for her groom. The "voice" announces the startling reality that God is not aloof and distant, but a neighbor who lives with us. God will not be capricious and turn from us like one might abandon another. God's love for us and our love for God will be perfected in the world to come. We will be one with God and one with each other. The voice from heaven cries out with words of assurance, "Behold, I make all things new again." The Lord promises to be with his people.

GOSPEL: John 13:31-33, 34-35

Today's Gospel reading precedes and introduces Jesus' final discourse with his disciples (John 14-17). Two main points are the focus of this reading: first, Jesus announces his departure ("I will be with you only a little while longer") and second, Jesus speaks of providing his disciples with a "new commandment." Jesus reminds his followers that they need not fear or despair. This is his path to glory. He knows his time with them is short and gives them a commandment that is old and vet he describes it as new; love one another. This commandment transformed Jesus, who demonstrates a new, in unreasonable, and unending love that must be modeled. Jesus will instruct his disciples very soon in his final discourse that "no one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). We will follow the pattern Christ gave us and enable the world to recognize Christ in us. This Gospel reminds us of our ultimate destiny: to share in the glory of God in heaven.

May is the Month of Mary!

As the Mother of God, the Virgin Mary has a unique position among the saints, indeed, among all creatures. She is exalted, yet still one of us.

Redeemed by reason of the merits of her Son and united to Him by a close and indissoluble tie, she is endowed with the high office and dignity of being the Mother of the Son of God, by which account she is also the beloved daughter of the Father and the temple of the Holy Spirit. Because of this gift of sublime grace she far surpasses all creatures, both in heaven and on earth. At the same time, however, because she belongs to the offspring of Adam she is one with all those who are to be saved. (Lumen Gentium, no. 53)

Mary embraces God's will and freely chooses to cooperate with God's grace, thereby fulfilling a crucial role in God's plan of salvation. Throughout the centuries, the Church has turned to the Blessed Virgin in order to come closer to Christ. Many forms of piety toward the Mother of God developed that help bring us closer to her Son. In these devotions to Mary, "while the Mother is honored, the Son, through whom all things have their being and in whom it has pleased the Father that all fullness should dwell, is rightly known, loved and glorified and . . . all His commands are observed." The Church honors her as the Mother of God, looks to her as a model of perfect discipleship, and asks for her prayers to God on our behalf.

Saint of the Week | St. Bernadine of Siena • 1380-1444 • Feast Day–May 20

This renowned Italian preacher was canonized only six years after he died. He was born near Siena and studied at the university there. He was ordained a Franciscan priest in 1404. From 1417 until his death 27 years later, he crisscrossed northern and central Italy as an itinerant preacher who drew enormous crowds by focusing on honest and penitential living and on reverence for the holy name of Jesus which led to the spread of this devotion. He also preached against gambling and materialism and turned down three requests to become a bishop.
