

Liturgical Reflection ~ 4th Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING: Acts 13:14, 43-52

Today's reading finds Paul and Barnabas in the synagogue in the region of Antioch. The readings suggests that their work to reveal the risen Christ to the people was highly effective, as almost the whole city came together to hear their preaching. he Jews, however, distanced themselves more from the ways of Jesus. For those who are willing to listen and come to faith, the gift of great joy and ongoing spread of the Word is granted, but for those who choose to reject the teaching of the apostles, fear and jealousy will prevent them from accepting the gift of salvation. Paul discerned a call to take the Gospel to anyone and everyone who would hear it.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 100

The Responsorial Psalm celebrates the fact that Jesus is our Good Shepherd and we are the sheep of his flock. This fact fills us with joy. We are not left to struggle through life by our own devices. We have a loving shepherd who will guide us with kindness and gentleness.

SECOND READING: Revelation 7:9, 14-17

The vision given to John is one of anticipated beauty. John sees the throne of God surrounded by a "great multitude." He hears of the promises of salvation. The elect of God stand in his presence and praise, with palm branches that represent victory. Representatives of all people are present. Human hearts long to hear words of comfort and assurance like those proclaimed at the end of this text. The promises of the freedom that comes in the presence of God, are inspiring. Jesus is the shepherd of everyone who follows his example of peace and forgiveness, which is the only path to life.

GOSPEL: John 10:27-30

MY SHEEP HEAR MY VOICE,
AND I KNOW THEM,
AND THEY FOLLOW ME.
—— John 10:27

Today's reading is the culmination of a long discourse in the Gospel of John which Jesus calls himself the Good Shepherd. The shepherd is a beautiful image of kindness and compassion, but also strong and courageous in protection of their flock. Here, Jesus makes promises to those who "hear his voice," whose hearts are open and recognize their dependence on God rather than on their observance of the Law, in contrast with those who have ears but do not hear. He is God's incarnate word, and therefore one with the Father. Jesus has an intimate knowledge of those he came to save and most importantly, the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep is based on the gift of eternal life. Jesus has handed his followers to the Father and no power is capable of removing them from his care. As easy as it might be to wander from the voice of the shepherd, it is far more difficult to be taken out of his grasp.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

The 4th Sunday of Easter is traditionally known as **Good Shepherd Sunday**. Hearing the Shepherd's voice, his followers recognize and know it is their God. Safe in the knowledge that they cannot be taken from the hand of the Shepherd, those who hear his voice follow as faithful believers willing to go where God calls and sends them. When all the clamor of false voices and seductive distractions threaten to overwhelm us, we have only to listen carefully to be led to do the work of the Father.





Today is also **World Day of Prayer for Vocations**. The purpose of this day is to publicly fulfill the Lord's instruction to, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into his harvest" (Mt 9:38;Lk 10:2). Please pray that young men and women hear and respond generously to the Lord's call to the priesthood, diaconate, religious life, societies of apostolic life, or secular institutes.






