

Liturgical Reflection ~ First Sunday of Advent

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 33:14-16

In today's First Reading, the Jeremiah announce the emergence of a shoot from David's line. This sprout from David's line mirrors an essential characteristic of God, one of righteousness or justice. The prophet offers sure hope in the midst of hardship saying, "The days are coming... I will fulfill the promise." His focus is on a future when current woes will cease, promises will be fulfilled, and transformation will be achieved so completely that all who look upon Judah will recognize the saving hand of God. A new name was assigned to Jerusalem – "The Lord our justice." God's justice consists of judgement against Judah's sins, but also mercy, and the mercy of God is evident in this reading.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 25

We cannot hope to be pleasing to God unless we open our hearts to his instruction. On our own, we are bound to fall into sinful and selfish habits. We fool ourselves by believing that what we are doing is what God wants but is really what we wanted to do. On the other hand, if we humble our hearts, we will be able to hear what God is trying to tell us. He wants us to choose justice for that is the only real path to a life filled with peace and joy.

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 3:12-4:2

In today's reading Paul is encouraging the community to not lose hope over the delay of the return of Christ in glory at the end of time. Paul and his Thessalonian converts expected the great and terrible day of Christ's return to be imminent. His advice during this between time is to continue turning their lives over to Christ, keep on loving one another as Paul instructed, remain pure and blameless in God's sight, so that we can one day reign with Christ forever.

GOSPEL: Luke 21:25-28, 34-36

We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear and that others will be frightened, Jesus' disciples are not to fear, but are to stand tall with their heads held high. Yet Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or tribulations. He encourages his disciples to pray for strength. We find in our Christian faith the means by which we witness to God's

unfailing love for us in all circumstances. Jesus' predictions about the end times may sound dire, but those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation in his words. Like the first Christians, we may encounter events and circumstances that could lead us to despair. Through prayer, however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus' words and in his continuing presence with us to endure all things and to witness to the action of God in our world.



PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

Do you knit or crochet? If so, please consider helping someone in need of your love by making them a simple prayer shawl. When they are alone or cold, when they need to feel the love of someone who cares, they can snuggle under a prayer shawl. A beautiful testimony: A lady was in treatment for breast cancer and was

gifted a prayer shawl, which brought her to tears. She would wrap up in it when she needed courage and strength, or to feel warm or love from the person who made it for her. She stated that it was a comfort and prayer every time she wrapped up in it. That was 15 years ago and she still has her shawl, and it has comforted many since, as when she was finished with treatment and working in her office, it would be folded in a chair and often people who came to her office, would reach for it and hold it and she would know God's love was still at work. You can do the same for someone now. Please call Jan Bernethy, 307-267-0677 for more information.

Directions are simple and easy. Knitting: use needles size 11 or 13, cast between 54-63 stitches, knit 3, purl 3 to end of row, repeat. Crocheting: use a size P hook, chaining 48 loosely hooks, turn and double chain and repeat. The shawl should measure approx. 50" x 24" and optional fringe can be added to each end. Variegated Lion Brand yarn is wonderful to use. Yarn and needles can be provided. We are in need of shawls made from neutral or darker colors of yarn, but any color is greatly appreciated.

Gifts for Seeds of Hope should be placed under the tree in a plastic bag.



ADVENT SEASON

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C).

The Advent Wreath

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used. The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

Blessing Of The Advent Wreath

The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent. When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response: Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, Isaiah 9: (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or

Isaiah 63 (lines 16-17 & 19) or Isaiah 64 (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **Response**: Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation.

May he come quickly and not delay.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

The First Sunday of Advent



Advent Begins!

November 28 - December 24

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas.

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas. From the earliest days of the Church, people have been fascinated by Jesus' promise to come back. But the scripture readings during Advent tell us not to waste our time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation. Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.


As we prepare for Christmas, the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* notes some differences to the Mass that should be observed during the season. For instance, the priest will wear violet or purple during Advent, except for the Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) when rose is worn (GIRM, no. 316). Aside from what the priest wears, other aesthetic changes in the Church can include a more modestly decorated altar.

The final days of Advent, from December 17 to December 24, we focus on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord at Christmas. In particular, the "O" Antiphons are sung during this period and have been by the Church since at least the eighth century. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming of Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but of present ones as well.

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Our Advent calendar above can help you fully enter into the season with daily activity and prayer suggestions to prepare you spiritually for the birth of Jesus Christ.
