
Church Hours/Adoration

Liturgical Reflection ~ 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

Today's readings challenge us to evaluate the sincerity of our personal belief that we will be raised up after death to a new kind of life. The graphic details surrounding the physical torture and death of the seven brothers help to emphasize their religious commitment to the law that forbids the eating of pork. The resolve of each of them to be faithful to their tradition is a teaching about the Resurrection. Their steadfast belief impressed the king and his attendants; but their faith is in another King who will raise them up to live forever.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 17

Psalm 17 is a prayer of supplication that the Lord will hear the cry of the faithful servant. The one who prays confesses fidelity to the path of the Lord and regards himself as "the apple of your eye," a term of endearment. The image of God is that of a bird, perhaps the mother of the species who would provide protection "in the shadow" of their wings.

SECOND READING: 2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5

This passage from Paul is in three parts. In the first Paul calls down a blessing upon "brothers and sisters" that they will be encouraged and strengthen in "every good deed and word." Then he asks them to pray for his mission among the unbelievers. Finally, he proclaims that the Lord is faithful and it is the Lord who will direct them in the way of love of God. We often speak of "God's work" because it is God who does the work, not us. That is why failure should never daunt us. Often what look likes failure is just a step on the journey, led by God, toward the expansion of his Kingdom. That is why Paul reminds us that "the Lord is faithful." It is Christ we follow and Christ who will win the day. Our task is to show up and put our gifts and our lives at God's disposal. This text ends as it began, with a prayer. The prayer asks that hearts remain focused on God's love for them. It is that love that sustains us. When we forget it, we lose our way.



GOSPEL: Luke 20:27-38

The Gospel presents a teaching on the Resurrection; there is an obvious connection here to the First Reading. Once again, a group of Jewish religious authorities tries to discredit Jesus' teachings. The Sadducees, who because they do not believe in resurrection from the dead, promote traditions that focus on earthly blessing like prosperity and posterity. They taught that there would be a generally resurrection of all people at the last judgement, but it is not clear if they expected this to be a spiritual or bodily resurrection. The context of today's reading is the rather

ridiculous situation of seven brothers who married the same woman but all died without any offspring and the question of whose wife she will be at the resurrection. Jesus instructs the Sadducees that the identity and relationships of those who rise from the dead is very different from the ones they have on earth. Heavenly life will transcend our categories; there, death will be no more and we will be simply "children of God" enjoying an angelic existence. The declaration that the Lord is "not God of the dead, but of the living" is the truth Jesus came to proclaim both through his life and teaching, but most of all through his own Resurrection from the dead.

Prayer for Vocations

God our Father, we thank you for calling men and women to serve in your Son's Kingdom as priests, deacons, and consecrated persons. Send your Holy Spirit to help others to respond generously and courageously to your call. May our community of faith support vocations of sacrificial love in our youth and young adults. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen



Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

In celebration of National Bible Week, Mary Elizabeth Sperry, associate director for the utilization of the New American Bible at the USCCB, shares 10 points for fruitful Scripture reading.


- 1. Bible reading is for Catholics. The Church encourages Catholics to make reading the Bible part of their daily prayer lives. Reading these inspired words, people grow deeper in their relationship with God and come to understand their place in the community God has called them to in himself.
- 2. Prayer is the beginning and the end. Reading the Bible is not like reading a novel or a history book. It should begin with a prayer asking the Holy Spirit to open our hearts and minds to the Word of God. Scripture reading should end with a prayer that this Word will bear fruit in our lives, helping us to become holier and more faithful people.
- 3. Get the whole story! When selecting a Bible, look for a Catholic edition. A Catholic edition will include the Church's complete list of sacred books along with introductions and notes for understanding the text. A Catholic edition will have an imprimatur notice on the back of the title page. An imprimatur indicates that the book is free of errors in Catholic doctrine.
- 4. The Bible isn't a book. It's a library. The Bible is a collection of 73 books written over the course of many centuries. The books include royal history, prophecy, poetry, challenging letters to struggling new faith communities, and believers' accounts of the preaching and passion of Jesus. Knowing the genre of the book you are reading will help you understand the literary tools the author is using and the meaning the author is trying to convey.
- 5. Know what the Bible is and what it isn't. The Bible is the story of God's relationship with the people he has called to himself. It is not intended to be read as

- history text, a science book, or a political manifesto. In the Bible, God teaches us the truths that we need for the sake of our salvation.
- 6. The sum is greater than the parts. Read the Bible in context. What happens before and after - even in other books - helps us to understand the true meaning of the text.
- 7. The Old relates to the New. The Old Testament and the New Testament shed light on each other. While we read the Old Testament in light of the death and resurrection of Jesus, it has its own value as well. Together, these testaments help us to understand God's plan for human beings.
- 8. You do not read alone. By reading and reflecting on Sacred Scripture, Catholics join those faithful men and women who have taken God's Word to heart and put it into practice in their lives. We read the Bible within the tradition of the Church to benefit from the holiness and wisdom of all the faithful.
- 9. What is God saying to me? The Bible is not addressed only to long-dead people in a faraway land. It is addressed to each of us in our own unique situations. When we read, we need to understand what the text says and how the faithful have understood its meaning in the past. In light of this understanding, we then ask: What is God saying to me?
- 10.Reading isn't enough. If Scripture remains just words on a page, our work is not done. We need to meditate on the message and put it into action in our lives. Only then can the word be "living and effective." (Hebrews 4:12).

"Indeed the word of God is living and effective. . . and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart." (Heb 4:12, Lectionary)


