

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

During Eucharistic Adoration, we watch and wait, we remain silent in His Presence, and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist. By worshiping the Eucharistic Jesus, we become what God wants us to be! Like a magnet, The Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us. In its fullest essence Eucharistic Adoration is God and Man reaching out for each other, at the same time!

You are invited to grow in faith and love of our Lord with us, by coming to Eucharistic Adoration. Every Tuesday from 8:00am – 6:00pm, adoration is held at St. Peter's. All are invited to

participate. You are free to visit any time without signing up. If you wish to sign up for a committed weekly hour, a sign-up sheet can be found on the bulletin board in the church or you can call Rhonda Gooch at 570-724-3092.

How does one spend an hour before Jesus exposed in the Blessed Sacrament? This hour Jesus wants you to spend with Him is spent any way you want. You may bring your own prayer books, use the books in the chapel, read the Bible, pray the Rosary, or just sit, relax and enjoy the sweet peace that comes from simply being in the Presence of God. You may feel you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The mere fact that you take time out each week to spend an hour with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament pleases Him very much and is in itself, a prayer of great faith.

Liturgical Reflection ~ 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: 1 Kings 17:10-16

Today's First Reading tells the story of a poor widow from the town of Zarephath. There was a great drought. The widow only had a small amount of food when Elijah, the man of God, asked her for something to eat. She replied that she was preparing what little she had for her and her son and then she then they would die. Elijah reassured her that she would not suffer from want. She trusted and obeyed him and prepared a cake of bread for him to eat. This reading underscores the tremendous trust of both Elijah and the widow of Zarephath. God speaks through the Elijah. The prophet is the spokesman, but it is God who acts.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 146


The Responsorial Psalm celebrated the fact that the Lord cares for those who have no one else to provide for their needs. The Lectionary provides two options for the psalm refrain. In the first, we offer a short exclamation of our praise of God. In the second, a single "Alleluia" declares our praise of God. The verses of the psalm evidence God's providential care for his people, especially those most in need and unable to care for themselves. We, too, should try and reach out and care for those who may have been left behind and need a helping hand.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 9:24-28

This reading continues the theme from last week that Jesus, our High Priest, has offered himself as the perfect offering for all, to bring about our forgiveness and reconciliation. The Old Testament priests had to offer many sacrifices because all of their sacrifices were imperfect and none of them fully accomplished that which was intended – to free us from our sins. This one perfect sacrifice of Jesus does not need to ever be repeated, for it has surpassed and completed what the Old Law never envisioned could be accomplished. When Christ appears again, this time it will be to bestow salvation at the end of time.

GOSPEL: Mark 12:38-44

Throughout Scriptures, the biblical authors portray God as caring for the poor. The widow, the orphan, the foreigner, and all who are in need are the concern of God and his people. Today's Gospel shows a powerful contrast between the scribes show loved to be seen and adored and the poor widow who contributes everything she has to the temple. Jesus taught that real giving must come from the heart. A gift that is given with a grudge or for display loses most of its value. But a gift given out of love, with a spirit of generosity and sacrifice, is invaluable. The amount or size of the gift doesn't matter as much as the cost to the giver. The poor widow could have



kept one of her coins, but instead she gave away all she had and was praised by Jesus as someone who gave barely a penny because it was everything she had, her whole living. What we have to offer may look very small and not worth much, but if we put all we have at the Lord's disposal, no matter how insignificant it may seem, then God can do with it, and with us, what is beyond our reckoning.






BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

COVID POLICIES AND PROCEDURE REMINDERS

With the arrival of the colder months comes the height of cold and flu season. Since we will all be spending more time indoors, it is helpful to remind everyone about our ongoing COVID policies and procedures to help keep everyone as safe as possible. Here are some important reminders:

- The Diocese of Scranton continues to <u>strongly recommend</u> that all parishioners wear a mask while attending Mass, regardless of their vaccination status. Mask wearing remains an important mitigation tool against community spread. Extra masks can be found at the entrances of the church.
- Masks are required for all students and teachers in our religious education program, regardless of vaccination status.
- Hand sanitizer can be found near all entrances to the church. It is encouraged that everyone sanitizes their hands upon entering the building.
- If you have been advised to quarantine or if you are experiencing any symptoms of COVID (or any other seasonal illness), please do not come to Mass or religious education class. As an act of charity, anyone who believes they might have COVID or is feeling ill, should stay home. Please be assured you are not committing a sin. By longstanding Church law, the Sunday obligation does not apply to those who are:
 - o Sick
 - Have a serious health risk
 - o In a household with those at risk
 - o Primary caregivers to those at risk
 - o Have serious anxiety or concerns about being in a large-group setting due to COVID
 - Unable to attend Mass in person

Stay home from Mass or religious education class if you or the student:
