Liturgical Reflection ~ 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Exodus 17:8-13

The attack on Israel by the Amalekites occurs after the Lord brings the people through the Red Sea, during their wandering in the desert. However, the militaristic tone of this passage should not detract from the underlying meaning of the text. Moses, Joshua, Aaron, and Hur all play prominent roles in the life of God's people. Although God is not mentioned in this passage, the author's perspective is that God intends to protect the chosen people. When Moses raises his hands the Israelites prevail, but it is the power of the Lord God who acts through Moses. All the details told in this passage show that the victory is clearly the result of God's fighting on Israel's side.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 121

I lift up my eyes to the mountains where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth The psalmist proclaims the all-encompassing providence of God. God, the guardian of Israell never sleeps; there is no time when God is not present to take care of the one who prays. Every journey, you're coming and you're going, is under the protection of the Lord who has made heaven and earth.

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2

In this passage, Scripture refers to the Jewish writings that trace the relationship that developed between God and Israel up to the time of Christ. Paul continues to instruct and encourage Timothy in preaching the Word of God. Paul reminds Timothy that all of Scripture is inspired by God; here Paul is referring to the writings of the Old Testament. Paul understands that Jesus came to fulfill the Scriptures and that persistence in proclaiming the Word of God was his primary responsibility. He urges Timothy to make it his as well. Timothy must teach how God uses the incidents of daily life to increase our faith, to build our competence, and to equip up for the unique work that God has given us to do.

GOSPEL: Luke 18:1-8

Jesus' parable stresses that his disciples must pray always without becoming weary and without losing heart. He insists that their prayers, like the staff of God that Moses and his helpers held high, channel God's saving power into earthly situations. Today he speaks of a local judge and a widow who is taken advantage of because she has no man to speak for her. The reader of today's story is easily caught up in the plea of the widow for a just hearing from the judge. Her persistence is admirable and Jesus turns the encounter into a lesson on prayer. The actions of the dishonest and unwilling judge are contrasted with the just and speedy response by God to the pleas of the chosen ones. Jesus states that such prayer comes from faith.



Today's Gospel ends with the daunting question: When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth? We are reminded of the importance of keeping close to God in prayer. If not here and in our hearts, where will the Risen Christ find faith on the earth? Will he find any disciples praying, holding high the staff of God, over the dangers that assail them? Will the risen Christ find any people whom he can send his saving grace into the world?

SECOND COLLECTION

In view of the devastation caused by Hurricane Ian and Hurricane Fiona in the southeast United States starting in Florida, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, and Caribbean, many lives have been lost along with severe damage and destruction to properties. Catholic Charities USA and local agencies have provided humanitarian relief supplying food, water, and sanitation assistance. Repair and rebuilding of homes will take place as soon as possible. A needs assessment has been made in contact with Bishops in impacted dioceses.

To respond to this need, Archbishop Jose H. Gomez, President, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has suggested that a voluntary special collection be taken up as soon as possible for the humanitarian, long-term recovery, and significant Church needs arising from these disasters. The collection will be taken up the weekend of October 15-16, 2022. The collection will be sent to the USCCB Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund so that those most in need can receive assistance quickly. Funds will be used in response to the hurricanes and the impact of subsequent flooding and tornados and any other disasters that occur and will be distributed where they are most needed.

October is Respect Life Month and Month of Holy Rosary

October is Respect Life month and also the month of the Holy Rosary. Before each Mass, daily and weekend, we will pray a decade of the rosary for the increase in vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life and for the respect of all life from the moment of conception to natural death.





Why Do Catholics Pray the Rosary?

Catholics pray the rosary because it's a powerful prayer to God, through His mother, Mary. Praying the rosary has been a tradition in the Church for a long time. It's a bit fuzzy who made it more formal; some say it was St. Dominic and others say it wasn't. What really matters is that this prayer is super powerful.

Throughout Church history, many popes and saints have highly recommended that we pray the rosary. Saint Louis de Montfort said, 'When the

Holy Rosary is said well, it gives Jesus and Mary more glory and is more meritorious than any other prayer.'

The rosary begins with the recitation of the Apostle's Creed, an Our Father, three Hail Mary's and a Glory Be. Then there are five decades which each begin and end with an Our Father and Glory Be, and have ten Hail Mary's in between. When you pray the rosary, you meditate on the events in Jesus' life. There are the joyful, luminous, sorrowful, and glorious mysteries.

In various apparitions, Mary has appeared holding a rosary and has asked that we continue to pray this prayer. She always leads us to her Son, and presents our needs before Him. Prayer is about developing our relationship with God, and loving Him more, so it makes sense to get to know Him through the events of the life of Christ that we meditate on during the rosary.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says: 'Meditation engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire. This mobilization of faculties is necessary in order to deepen our convictions of faith, prompt the conversion of our heart, and strengthen our will to follow Christ. Christian prayer tries above all to meditate on the mysteries of Christ, as in lectio Divina or the rosary. This form of prayerful reflection is of great value, but Christian prayer should go further to the knowledge of the love of the Lord Jesus, to union with him'(CCC 2708).

Rosaries are not just decorations. Battles have been won because people prayed the rosary! There have been hearts converted, and impossible intentions answered too. Your life can only be blessed if you start praying the rosary.

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

St. John Paul II | DATES: 1920-2005 FEAST DAY -OCTOBER 22

When this popular pope died, crowds in St. Peter's Square chanted "santo subito" ("sainthood now"). The Vatican heard, and the sainthood cause for the jet-setting pontiff who helped bring down European communism was put on the fast track; he was beatified in 2011. A strong admirer of St. Faustina and her dedication to Divine Mercy, John Paul II was canonized on Divine Mercy Sunday 2014 by Pope Francis. A Pole and former actor shaped by World War II and the Cold War, Cardinal Karol Wojtyla of Krakow (John Paul II) was the first non-Italian pope in 455 years. In his 26-year pontificate, he evangelized on trips to 129 countries, upheld traditional church doctrine against dissent, connected with the world's youth, established World Youth Day, and named more than 450 new saints. He also modeled Christian values by forgiving his would-be assassin and living an increasingly frail old age in public.
