# **Liturgical Reflection** ~ 27<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

### FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:14-17

This passage about the healing of Naaman is rich with images. He plunges into the water seven times, a number that denotes fulfillment. His healing brings conversion and thanksgiving, and a promise to worship the God of Israel. Elisha's refusal of gifts for his service reflects his awareness that he did only what God required, so any reward will come from the Lord. Both men are bold exemplars of faith lived and spoken with conviction.

### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 98**

All through the Old Testament the sea and land and sky stand as witnesses to God's covenant with Israel. The nations, on the other hand, were most often witnesses to God's wrath. Here they become witnesses to God's justice and mercy and his willingness to save the people of Israel. Even though they were not yet considered to be God's people, they were called upon to praise God for his wondrous works and in doing so were foreshadowing that time when they would be the recipients of justice and mercy and salvation themselves.

### SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-13

Paul writes to Timothy from prison and uses his situation to give a perspective on the power of the Word of God. He boldly proclaims that the word of God is not chained. This statement is intended to give courage to those who will proclaim their own testimony of the Risen Lord. Their salvation lies in believing that those who have died with the Lord will also reign with him in glory. Paul's key word appears at the beginning: remember. That's what the liturgy is, an act of ritual remembrance of the saving acts of God in Christ. Paul is not theorizing but speaking from the heart about his own lived experience of faith. He has preached this gospel and is now suffering for it, writing from a prison cell. Paul suffers willingly because he trusts that his suffering will be for the benefit of those who have come to know Christ.





The healing of the ten lepers is another story of Luke's account that proclaims the interventions of God in the struggle of those who seek relief from human events. The narrative bears testimony to the compassion of God for those unjustly left on the edges of society through no fault of their own. But there is a concluding teaching for all of us: giving thanks for God's great love is also expected. The ten had demonstrated faith by calling out to Jesus and addressing him as master. That only one returns genuinely disappoints Jesus. The nine settled for too little for had they returned, they too would have received the

far greater gift he gives the Samaritan: the promise of salvation. The humble Samaritan gave thanks to Jesus. He showed true gratitude, which should be an attitude we all show toward the Lord for all the good things he has done for us.

### SECOND COLLECTION

In view of the devastation caused by Hurricane Ian and Hurricane Fiona in the southeast United States starting in Florida, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, and Caribbean, many lives have been lost along with severe damage and destruction to properties. Catholic Charities USA and local agencies have provided humanitarian relief supplying food, water, and sanitation assistance. Repair and rebuilding of homes will take place as soon as possible. A needs assessment has been made in contact with Bishops in impacted dioceses.

To respond to this need, Archbishop Jose H. Gomez, President, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has suggested that a voluntary special collection be taken up as soon as possible for the humanitarian, long-term recovery, and significant Church needs arising from these disasters. The collection will be taken up the weekend of October 15-16, 2022. The collection will be sent to the USCCB Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund so that those most in need can receive assistance quickly. Funds will be used in response to the hurricanes and the impact of subsequent flooding and tornados and any other disasters that occur and will be distributed where they are most needed.

Altar Flower Arrangements — 1 arrangement \$70, 2 arrangements \$140






# October Month of The Holy Rosary



### SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Isaac Jogues Feast Date-October 19

Born in Orleans, France, Isaac joined the Jesuits at a young age and was sent to his order's North American mission in 1636. He and Rene Goupil were captured and tortured by a band of Iroquois in 1642. Rene was killed and Isaac was held as a slave until his rescue by Dutch settlers. He returned to France, secured permission to continue saying Mass despite mutilated hands, and returned to Canada in 1644. He and John Lalande were tomahawked and beheaded by Huron Indians who invited them to a meal. These three and five others, the North American martyrs, are patron saints of Canada and North America. They share this feast and shrines in New York State and Ontario, Canada.

### **CHRIST OUR HOPE**

This is an excerpt from the 2019-2020 Respect Life Materials from the USCCB.

Hope is not false optimism or empty positivity. Christian hope is something much more profound and goes to the very depths of our identity as followers of Christ.


Like us, Christ entered the world through the womb of a woman. He willingly experienced the fullness of human suffering. He breathed his last on the Cross at Calvary in order that He might save us. Therefore, "God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end" (*Spe salvi* 31).

Christians know "they have a future: it is not that they know the details of what awaits them, but they know in general terms that their life will not end in emptiness" (SS 2).

For this reason, a woman experiencing a difficult pregnancy can find the strength to welcome her previous child into the world. A man facing a terminal diagnosis can see that the end of his earthly life is only the beginning of eternal life with Christ.
