

Liturgical Reflection ~ 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Amos 8:4-7

The prophet Amos strikes out at those who exploit the poor and take advantage of those he calls "the lowly" when they come to the marketplace. The prophet uses the very words of the dishonest merchants as his judgment against them. His condemnation lies in reminding them that the Lord will not forget their wrongdoing.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 113

This psalm is a hymn of praise to the Lord who is king over all the earth. It is a reminder that we cannot hide our activities from God. We cannot pretend that we can do things that he does not see. We must live in a manner that is consistent with what we say we are. We cannot say that we are Christians and live in a way that might give scandal to others. This means that we must trust in the providence of God; it cannot depend upon our own efforts.

SECOND READING: 1Timothy 2:1-8

Paul instructs Timothy to exhort the believers to pray. It seems that Paul expects these prayers of petitions and thanksgiving to be done by the community at their common worship. Another reason for prayer is that God desires such prayer. These prayers are for the salvation of others, for God desired everyone to be saved. The prayers of the community are to be offered "without anger or argument."

GOSPEL: Luke 16:1-13

The parable of the unjust steward presents a lesson about judging wisely worldly affairs in serving God instead of mammon. The commendation of the unjust steward makes the meaning of the parable difficult to grasp. The "children of this world" are contrasted with the "the children of light"; the former are good at worldly affairs, but the latter are charged with the "true wealth" that God will bestow on them. Worldly resources in themselves are not condemned, but should be used wisely, not clung to, with the understanding that all earthly goods will pass away, and if we have been able




understanding that all earthly goods will pass away, and if we have been able to see where our salvation ultimately lies and let go of the immediate and worldly, we will be "welcomed into eternal dwellings." If "you are not trustworthy with dishonest wealth" reminds us that our behavior here on earth influences our eternity. Finally, we must remember that money must be used with a view to our heavenly destiny and that destiny requires sharing with the less fortunate. Money cannot become an idol that has usurped God's rightful place at the center of our lives.

CATECHETICAL SUNDAY

Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. This year, the Church will celebrate Catechetical Sunday on September 18, 2022, and the theme is: "This is my body given for you."

Those who the parish community has designated to serve as catechists will be called forth to be commissioned for their ministry.

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life. The term "Eucharist" originates from the Greek word eucharistia, meaning thanksgiving. In the celebration of the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit and the instrumentality of the priest. The whole Christ is truly present -- body, blood, soul, and divinity -- under the appearances of bread and wine, the glorified Christ who rose from the dead. This is what the Church means when she speaks of the "Real Presence" of Christ in the Eucharist.


INTERESTED IN THE CATHOLIC FAITH?

Buildings and Grounds Committee Meeting September 8, 2022

Present: Fr. Jacek, Francis Kennedy, Rick Joachim, Mike Buono

Absent: Marty Ostapowicz

Meeting began at 10:00 am and was opened with an Our Father led by Father Jacek.

- 1. Father Jacek suggested that a walk through of the church and facilities be conducted to determine what problems need to be addressed and the order of importance of said problems.
- 2. Rick Joachim will make a list of items that need to be done and submit it to the office at which point father will prioritize the repairs before any actions or repairs will be undertaken.
- 3. Items that were brought up for repair are as follows:
- A. Gutters on the parish center and rectory need to be cleaned out.
- B. Flat roof repair on the parish center hall way. A suggestion was made for a temporary repair to the roof by Rick to place a sheet of 1/2 inch marine grade plywood over a soft spot so no further damage could occur until a more permanent solution could be found. Chilson Brothers and other contractors will be contacted to inspect the damage and give quotes on repairs.
- C. The condensation lines from the air conditioning unit over the organ is leaking and needs to be replaced. Rick Joachim will make the repairs.
- D. Lights on the parish center exterior need to be repaired and the chandelier in the church has a wiring or switch issue that has to be addressed. Problem has to be located.
- E. 3 out of 4 fans in on the church ceiling do not work and have to be inspected and possibly replaced. It may be a switch issue and Rick will check that to see if that is the problem. If not, is may be the whole fan itself. Scaffolding must be rented to reach them in the event that they need to be replaced.

BLESSING OF ANIMALS




