

Liturgical Reflection ~ 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Amos 6:1, 4-7

Amos continues his denunciation of those who ignore the lot of others. In last Sunday's text it was the dishonest merchants. Today he criticizes the rich who care only about their own comfort, ignoring the plight of the poor. He does not condemn their wealth but their complacency. Their wealth allows them to have lavish meals and the best oils; they drink wine from bowls as though there was no end to the abundance they enjoy. Their selfish actions will lead to their exile.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 146



Psalm 146 is a hymn of praise and thanksgiving to the Lord who is good and loving and generous. The way that God expresses this goodness is by being the refuge to those in need. He is a guarantor of justice for those who have no one to defend them. If we are faithful


followers of God, we will reach out to those same people.

SECOND READING: 1Timothy 6:11-16

Paul's letter to Timothy encourages him to be faithful to the commandment of God until the return of Jesus Christ. Paul would know and expect that his letter would be read to the local gathering of believers and so the phrase "I charge you" could apply to those who listen to the reading of his letter as well as to Timothy. In this vein, the words of Paul's letter are addressed also to us. Paul tells us to "Compete well for the faith" or "fight the good fight of the faith." There is a constant struggle to act justly, patiently, gently – in a godly manner – in situations that demand all of one's mental and physical energy. Those who stay in the fight are laying hold of eternal life to which all the baptized are called.

GOSPEL: Luke 16:19-31

Jesus addresses the Pharisees with a parable that contrasts the actions of a rich man and a poor man. The contrast between those who care about others and those who do not, as noted in the First Reading and the Responsorial Psalm, is sharpened by the message of the parable. Jesus does not dwell on the status of the rich man, but rather on his being oblivious to the needs of the poor man "lying at his door"; he was his neighbor! The rich man is even more hardened in self-centeredness after death than he was in life. He knows the right language, calling out to "Father Abraham" and asks for "pity" but he expresses no remorse. God never



tires of forgiving us, but what is sometimes overlooked is the need to ask for forgiveness and accept God's mercy. It is possible to run out of time and there is no erasing the fate that follows the sounding of the bell. Today's parable haunts us with the possibility that after death, like the self-absorbed rich man, we too could find ourselves on the wrong side of an uncrossable chasm. Stuck there and suffering, we raise our eyes to see the Lord comforting the needy whom we ignored. It finally dawns on us that, like the rich man, we cannot improve our situation.

"Being a small flock, should not frighten us, but rather invite us to live this reality with faith, so that we can become leaven, salt and light for others, trusting in the action of the Holy Spirit, who blows freely where He wills."

"The activity of prayer is not only to be carried out at times of rest, but also during our daily life as a type of breathing of our living relationship with God."

"Let us not forget that peace is possible when weapons are silenced and dialogue begins! And let us continue to pray for the suffering people of Ukraine and for peace in every land bloodied by war."



Finance Council Meeting Minutes September 7, 2022 – 10:00am

Those present: Fr. Jacek, Tim Gooch, Jim Stager, Aaron Singe, Patti Mitchell Those Absent: Priscilla Walrath

Discussion Items:

- 1. The financial report for this fiscal year to date was reviewed. Collections are down, but that is normal for the summer months. All other income and expenses were in line with where they should be at this time.
- 2. Fr. Jacek supplied each member with the Diocesan Directives for Parish Finance Councils document.
- 3. Fr. Jacek shared a memo from Bishop Bambera with new protocol that all parishes must follow annually regarding financial transparency.
- 4. One member of the committee was asked to represent finance on parish council. Tim Gooch was chosen.
- 5. New members are needed. Aaron will reach out to one possible new member.
- 6. Carport The estimate to repair the carport is \$7,350. We are currently waiting for the insurance company to pay our claim. It was agreed that we would move ahead with the repairs, as we wait for payment. Chad Owlett will complete the work.
- 7. Rectory Garage Fr. Jacek would like to park his car in the garage. In order to do so, some work needs to be done, including a new garage door and opener. The estimate for the garage renovation is \$4,225. Chad Owlett will complete the work.
- 8. Fundraising Fr. Jacek would like to introduce more fundraising opportunities. Two that he has done at previous parishes will be implemented here in the very near future. Tim Gooch agreed to chair the newly created Fundraising Committee. Patti Mitchell also agreed to be on the committee. Other members will be recruited. A meeting for this committee is scheduled for Wednesday, September 21, 2022.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:05am


